SPECTRUM IN BLUE - MARTHA REEVES

Martha Reeves became introduced to Motown Records when, just out of high school, she worked as a secretary in the A&R department. She shortly had formed a female trio - Martha Reeves and the Vandellas - and one of their very first records, "Come and Get These Memories," became a gigantic hit in 1962. Martha's singing received world-wide acclaim after such hit sensations as "Heat Wave," "Jimmy Mack," "Ready for Love," and, of course, "Dancing in the Streets." The truth is that Martha Reeves and the Vandellas were one of the brightest stars in the Motown crown.

Naturally enough, sky-rocketing record sales led to an increased demand for personal appearances by the group. Over the years, Martha has performed numerous one-nighters in theaters such as the Regal (Chicago), the Apollo (New York), the Howard (Washington, D.C.), the Uptown (Philadelphia), and Madison Square Garden. She has also appeared at theaters-in-the-round like the Circle Star in the Bay Area. A great number of television shows have featured Martha Reeves as a guest, including appearances on Ed Sullivan, Johnny Carson, Dick Clark, Soul Train, Hullabaloo, and Speakeasy. She's done commercials for Peps Cola, and has worked on film scores.

Martha was raised in Detroit in a home filled with music and love. She is an active member of the Church and enjoys participating in religious activities. Her life consists of spirit-filled personal appearances.

After a long career at Motown, Martha moved on to MCA where she did one album, "Martha Reeves," with Richard Perry, and later did an album for Arista.

Martha Reeves is currently recording for the Fantasy label, with Hank Cosby producing. Hank and Martha shared musical growth at Motown Records, along with Smokey Robinson, Stevie Wonder, Marvin Gaye, and Sylvia Moy, to name a few of the many talents Martha Reeves knows and idolizes.

"We Meet Again" is therefore a most appropriate album title, for, once again, this marvelous musical team of Reeves and Cosby is working together. "We Meet Again" debuts a new collection of original tunes featuring Mickey Durio, Martha's accompanist and musical partner of long standing, and Dale Warren, also formerly with Motown and an arranger of gold-record status. "We Meet Again" is good rhythm and blues from a premier stylist, giving her all and loving every minute of it. Martha states: "Fantasy is the only company that's ever given me artistic freedom. I guess that's what inspired the song 'We Meet Again'."

"But what has actually kept me going for fifteen years is my early successes with Motown Records, and devoted fans picking up those MCA and Arista records. And hard work and a lot of faith. Becoming a newborn Christian was the greatest thing that's ever happened to me since becoming a mature adult. I think I'd always been developing a three-octave range, but my singing is better now that I'm saved. I asked the Lord to use me. All praise and glory goes to Him."

PSU incoming freshman get a head start

Students who will be attending a college or university next fall can get a headstart on the year's studies by enrolling in a summer program offered by Portland Community College at the Cascade Center.

Three four-week sessions will be offered this summer at the Cascade Center. Transfer courses are offered in business,

composition, economics, history, literature, mathematics, office occupations, Oregon geography, psychology and sociology. Students can attend one, two or all three of the sessions.

Colleges and universities under the State System of Higher Education will accept transfer credits from PCC in the courses offered and the college also has agreements with most of the private

colleges in the area to accept the transfer credits for the classes, Van Dyke noted.

Financial aid is available for the summer sessions and veteran benefits are applicable. Also, credits can be used towards completion of high school graduation requirements.

The Cascade Center is located at 705 N. Killingsworth.

PSU offers gymnastics

Gymnastics instruction for children from kindergarten through high school will be offered again this summer by the Portland State University Health and Physical Education Department.

There will be four two-week sessions for youngsters in three age groups, plus a fifth session for high school students only. Students are placed according to age and ability in the classes which are limited to only seven students each.

Instruction will be provided by members of the PSU varsity gymnastics team under the direction of Randy Carruthers, PE instructor and gymnastics coach.

Each two-week session will meet Monday through Friday and students may register for any or all of them. Carruthers encourages pre-registration since class size is limited.

The sessions are scheduled for: June 12-23; June 26-July 7; July 10-21; July 24-August 4; and the high school only session, August 7-18.

Cost of the instruction is \$30 per session. The fee includes insurance for each participant.

FACTS OF IMPORTANCE

The business community has recently acknowledged four specific facts about alcoholism:

1. Alcoholism is an illness, not a moral problem.
2. It can be treated successfully.
3. Many alcoholics are worth treating.
4. Persons afflicted with the disease of alcoholism are often the last to recognize or to accept their problem.

Five to ten percent (5% - 10%) of the employed population are in trouble with alcohol. In a large proportion of these cases, the problem has existed for five to seven years before becoming so obvious that action is required. Alcoholism has been identified by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare as the number one public health problem in the U.S.A. Only three percent (3%) of these alcoholics are on skid row, the other ninety-seven percent (97%) are found in homes, offices and factories.

Alcoholism turns out to be the billion dollar headache. Alcoholism costs industries \$15,000,000,000.00 (fifteen billion dollars), not to mention human suffering to the alcoholic himself, his family and his employer. Much of the inferior workmanship in many of our domestic products and services may be due directly or indirectly to the disease of alcoholism.

Many companies are dealing with this difficult and complex problem; from their experiences we get the following profile:

He/she is likely to be 38 to 56 years old; an employee of fairly long service in whom the company has a considerable investment especially if he/she is in the executive ranks.

Your company may be one involved with persons, employees, family or friends interested in alcoholism education and treatment. The House of Exodus will be happy to share specific facts regarding the disease of alcoholism.

The House of Exodus was incorporated on the 9th day of August, 1977, in the State of Oregon as a non-profit corporation for the sole purpose of establishing an alcoholism educational and treatment center. The goals are to improve the health, physical and mental well-being of its clientele. The primary objective is to educate and treat, through counseling and other supportive activities, persons afflicted with the disease of alcoholism. Secondly, our objective is to further research the social and metabolic effects of alcoholism and other substance additives in order to find causes, cures and preventive controls.
