The Federal government is making a concerted effort to

assist people in qualifying for Federal jobs. A workshop will be held on Saturday, November 18th, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Oddfellows Hall located at 3214 S.E. Holgate Boulevard. This workshop is to assist the public in passing the Civil Service Clerk-Steno Exam, to familiarize people with the application procedures, testing methods, and interview techniques. Presently there are many qualified positions with the various Federal agencies in the Portland area.

The operations of Portland's new dry dock are illustrated in a permanent exhibit now installed at the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry. A four-unit display consists of a model of the dry dock and vessel that may be worked by remote control, a time-lapse movie of a ship undergoing dry docking and repair, a slide show on Portland as a port, and an interactive computer. It may be viewed daily in OMSI's Max Lehman Agricultural Hall, and is free after the regular museum admission.

Flooney presents 'The Dutchman'

Two one-act plays, "Dutchman" by LeRoi Jones (Imamu Baraka) and "First Militant Minister" by Ben Caldwell will be presented at the Albina Women's League November 2nd-5th and 9th-12th at 8:30 p.m. The closing performance will be at the Portland Art Museum in the Berg-Swann Auditorium at 8:30 p.m. on November 24th.

Both plays are directed by Flooney (Benjamin Hardy), who produced "An Evening with Langston Hughes" in February.

Portland actors Susan Venters and Nathaniel (Butch) Haynes play in "Dutchman," Richard Jones and Henry Melson play in "First Militant Minister."

Centered squarely on the negro-white conflict, both "Dutchman" and "First Militant Minister" are literally shocking plays, in ideas, language and honest anger.

They illuminate a deadly serious problem and they bring an eloquent and exceptionally powerful voice to the American theater.

"Dutchman," Jones' best known play, opened in New York City on March 1964 and shortly after received *The Village Voice* Obie Award for the best off-Broadway play of 1963-64. He has published three collections of poems, six plays, two collections of articles, a novel, a volume of short stories, and other works.

Jones was the founder and Director of the Black Arts Repertory Theatre/School in Harlem.

Ben Caldwell is a Harlem essayist-playwright-artist whose plays have been performed in Harlem, at Newark's Spirit House and on the

West Coast by the Black Arts Alliance.

Tickets are \$2 general admission, and \$1.50 for students and senior
