"Jamaican Man." An album. The culmination of years of sun, sweat, toil and acquiring knowledge of every step of the way.

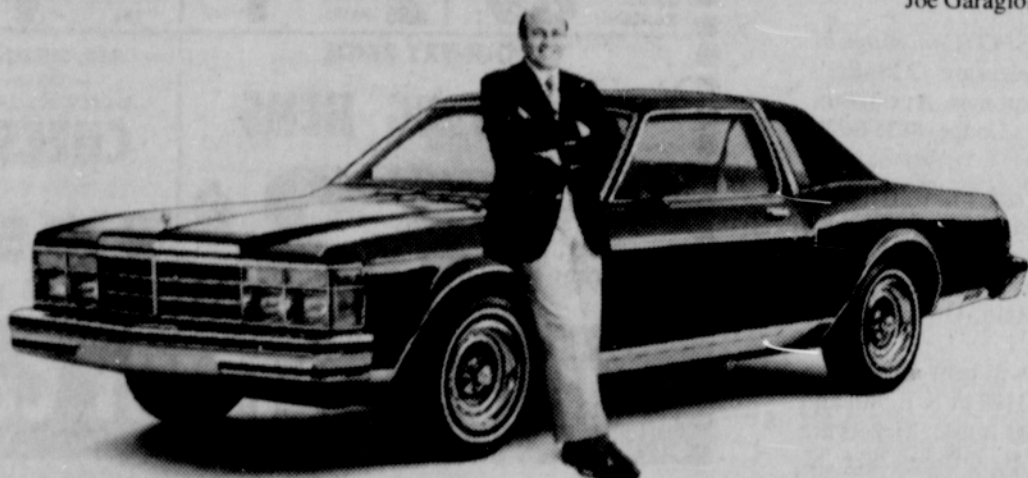

McPherson papers topic

Mrs. Osly J. Gates of Portland is lecturing and conferring on the heritage of the McPherson Papers in a special two-year series honoring the Reverend J. Gordon McPherson, early western author and editor. The lecture was first presented April 9th (the anniversary of his death) to the Genealogical Forum of Portland, Oregon, Inc.

Early this week, Mrs. Gates delivered the McPherson Memorial lecture at Eastern Washington University at Cheney as guest of the Black Education Program and the Department of History. Dr. C.T. Wright is coordinator of arrangements.

McPherson pioneered in community development and uplift; in many of the communities where he pastored he established a weekly newspaper.

McPherson heritage is documented in newspapers he founded,

minutes, sermons, authentic oral history regarding war, and numerous cultural contributions. Full-page photocopies of some of his newspapers are exhibited; the originals are in institutional libraries. He once served as secretary of the Western Negro Press Association. He was a member and representative of the National Negro Press Association. He held state and national offices in other groups.

For a limited time, McPherson and Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan sold one of their respective newspapers on a joint subscription coupon.

McPherson was a political activist and a civil libertarian. He personally pursued one civil rights case to the state supreme court.

Mrs. Gates is the daughter of the Reverend McPherson.

President, Ms. Amelia Lanier, OACW First Vice President and Mrs. Harrie Belle Paris, OACW President. The Henrietta Marshall Girls' Club, directed by Mrs. Yvonne Charles, Supervisor of Girls, will serve as hostesses for the Tea. The public is invited.

The Oregon Association of Colored Women's Clubs, organized in 1911 is Oregon's oldest Black women's organization, providing continuing civic, charitable and service to the community. Its by-law commitment to educational support has been carried out through the Scholarship Program since its inception; locally, \$500 is awarded annually, nationally OACW contributes to the NACWC United Negro College Fund Project which annually awards \$5,000 in the Northwest and \$5,000 in each of the four other regions of the United States for attendance to Black colleges. Mrs. Harrie Belle Paris is OACW President.
