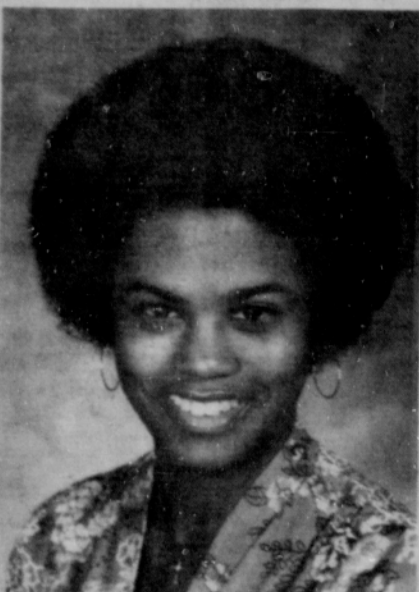

Portland pianist plans concert

On Saturday, May 12, 1979, JoAnn Richardson will give her Graduate Piano Recital at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, Massachusetts. She will be receiving a Master of Music Degree in Applied Piano from the Conservatory on May 20, 1979.

Before studying at the Conservatory, Miss Richardson attended Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Washington — from which she received a Bachelor of Music Degree — Magna cum Laude — in Piano Performance.

While attending school in Boston, Miss Richardson has been involved in many activities. For two years, she had an assistantship with the Boston Public Schools and New England Conservatory through which she worked with the Piano Department of the Madison Park High School Music Division; she has also been a substitute teacher in the Boston School System. JoAnn has performed as either a vocalist or pianist on various programs at the Conservatory given by the "Third Stream" and composition departments. In 1977, she was asked to perform the work, "Anticipations, Introspections and Reflections," for a seminar led by the composer — Hale Smith. Since 1977, she has been a member of the New England Conservatory Gospel Ensemble which has performed on television and other programs in the Boston area.

In addition to her school involvement, Miss Richardson is employed by the New England Conservatory Community Services Department where she teaches piano, directs the chorus and presents lectures/concerts.

With all of her activities, JoAnn finds time to be involved with helping young people and attending church. She attends People Baptist Church where she is the Assistant Music Director/pianist and Youth Choir Directors.

JoAnn, who was listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges, 1975-1976 — is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin M. Richardson and is a member of Vancouver Avenue First Baptist Church.

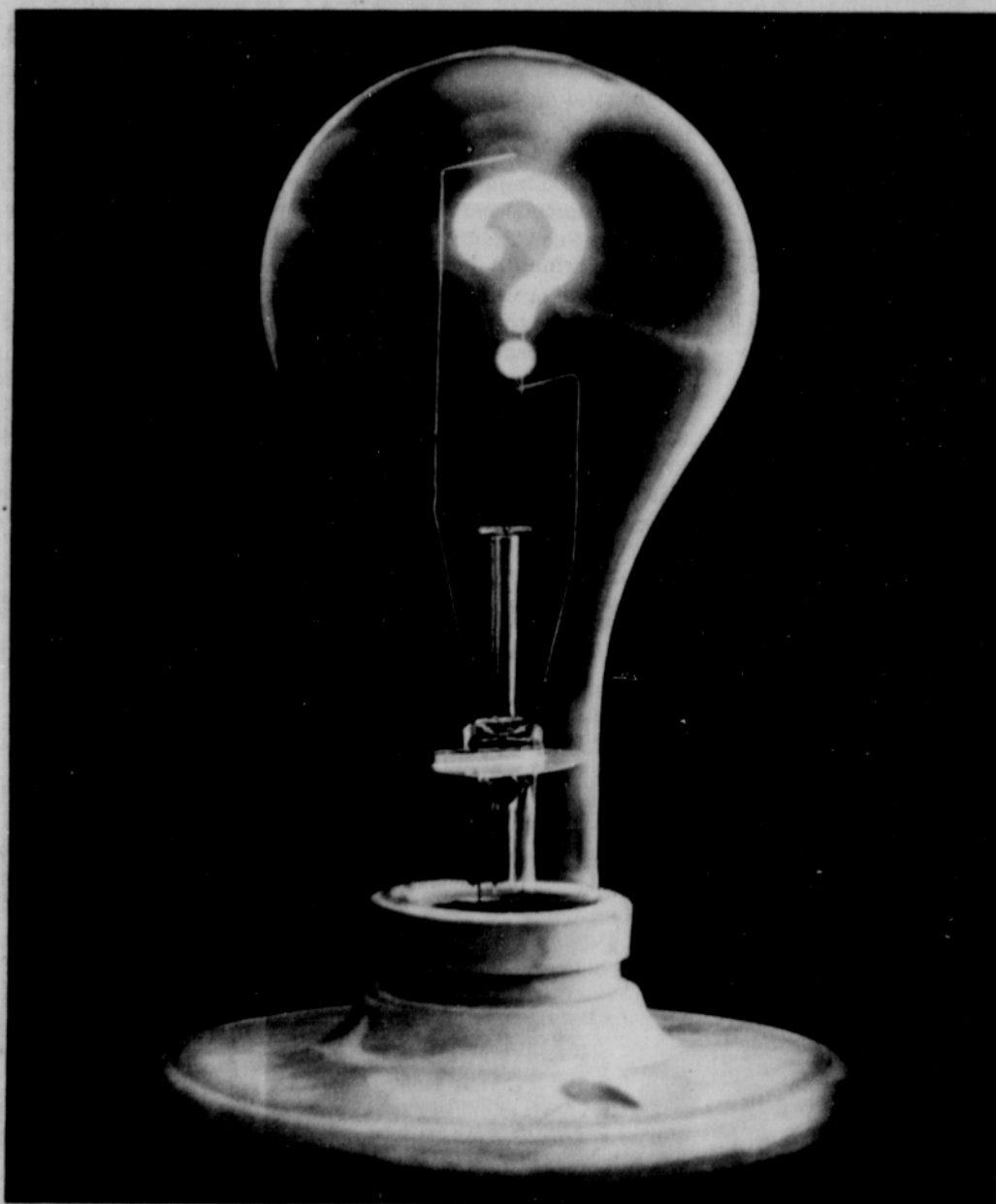
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WHETHER OR NOT YOUR LIGHTS GO ON SHOULDN'T DEPEND ON "IF"s.

We just barely met the peak requirement.

We had to buy costly power from California and Canada.

We had to borrow heavily on stored hydro energy. Then, to refill depleted reservoirs, we had to gamble on precipitation that might not have come.

But last winter's scare was just the prologue to an even greater problem facing the Northwest: the difficulty

of meeting not only peak power requirements, but day-in, day-out electrical needs.

You're Outgrowing Your Electric Supply.

FACT: Over 90% of the newly-built homes in Pacific Power's Northwest service area are using electricity for space and water heating. Heretofore, that percentage was slightly over 40%.

FACT: In 1978, new residential connected load was more than our 80% capacity share of the 330,000 kilowatt WYODAK plant in Wyoming... the newest coal fired plant in

Pacific Power's system.

FACT: Pacific Power's 10% share (248,000 kilowatts) of the Washington Public Power Supply System's generating units is less capacity than our annual residential heating demand.

That kind of growth says loud and clear that the region's present supply of electricity can't keep up with your demand.

Conservation is Critical, But It's Not Enough.

It is simply not possible, however urgent the need for conservation, to "save" all

the kilowatts needed to meet the region's growth.

Some new generation of electrical energy is required.

It cannot come from our rivers; they're already strapped to capacity.

Needed new generating plants are lagging at least three to six years behind schedule. Why? Conflicting environmental reports. Layers upon layers of red tape. The list goes on and on.

The result? Your electric supply is in jeopardy and your electric costs are going to skyrocket. Delays are adding tens of thousands of dollars each day to the cost of building new plants.
