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PCC soccer captain brings Dutch heritage to winning team

When Reggie Persijn, 27, was a five-year old in Holland, he used to kick a soccer ball around the back lot with his seven Dutch-Indonesian un-

Now he is team captain of an all-Portland soccer team which just won the Oregon Intercollegiate Soccer Association championship Saturday, November 17, at Monmouth--the Portland Community College Pan-

PCC defeated Southern Oregon College 2-1.

Persijn picked the ball away from SOC's aggressive offense with footwork and pass-and-play ball which he says he prefers.

Midfielder Gordon Bowen scored twice for PCC during the game. Freshman Matt Engels assisted on the first goal and Dave Martin assisted on the second.

Persijn, a graduate of Benson Polytechnic, who is now a criminal justice major at PCC, says jokingly that what he does, "is rob other schools of championships."

PCC defeated Southern Oregon last year for the championship and the University of Portland the previous year.

"Both of those teams had beat us earlier in the season of the year we played them for the title," Persijn said. "So they felt robbed."

Persijn has been a consistent scorer in a team of ex-Portland high school players which scatters scoring throughout the team rather than centering on a few stars, according to the coach Rudi Sommer.

Persijn lead the PCC team to a seven win-no loss-one tie season which included University of Oregon and Oregon State for opponents.

Persijn didn't play soccer from the time he left Holland at age six to move to Portland until he was 15. A friend of his older brother asked him to play for the Skyline Cardinals, a Portland City League team. "I didn't play until I was 15 because there were no teams until then," Persijn said. He said teams were coached by men who were reading the soccer rules from books and had no soccer experience.

"But once the Timbers came to Portland all that changed," Persijn said.

Persinjn said that "people are surprised that the PCC is all local: people from high schools around

here. Teams use to be just made up of foreigners living in the Portland area. But now we have good high school teams and good experienced coaching in Portland. We are starting to develop local players who can beat any of the ones from outside."

Persijn said the team's freshman goalkeeper, Chris Sigler from Beaverton High School, is among the talented hometown soccer players.

"Chris is a good goalie who has been getting used to defense players in front of him and handling the game very well," Persijn said.

He also sees Rocky Herauf, defender from Rex Putnam, as the PCC team's most improved player--"a left fullback with more confidence and teamwork than last year." Rich Smith, a PCC freshman from Jefferson High, has also improved because of confidence in the game and in team playing, according to

"The reason PCC is good is the attitude of the team," Persijn said. "We play well and we hang around together. If one player, no matter how good, doesn't get along with the others we would just as soon not have him."

Persijn said "stars" who just want to kick the ball in and score and are not team players are not recruited for the team.

"An attitude makes all the difference in soccer teams and a player," Persijn said. During the champsionship game Persijn and team members constantly shout encouragement and praise to one

another during the game. "When you make a mistake it is obvious," Rudi Sommer, the PCC coach, explained. "There's no reason to point it out, but when you do something right you ought to hear about it."

Persijn is also the team captain of a Portland City League team, the Hollindo Soccer Club. He was voted the Sportsman of the Year by the City League in 1975 and was on the first team of the City League's all star soccer team in 1978. He was the
