Community Development Block Grant

The Department of Environmental Services will hold a public hearing concerning the County's application to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for a two million dollar, three year Community Development Block Grant and Housing Assistance Plan. The purpose of this hearing, at the above time and location, is to present the grant program activities and receive public testimony on the grant and program activities.

The Community Development Block Grant is designed to principally aid low and moderate income persons over the next three years to help improve and repair the housing stock and housing choice, public services and facilities and employment opportunities for low and moderate income persons living in the eligible community target area. The eligible target area. The eligible target area includes portions of Cully/Parkrose, Hazelwood, Errol Heights and Powellhurst communities. Refer to the map.

Principal activities included in this three year grant program will be:

1. a home rehabilitation loan program, including a critical home repair program;
2. assisting the Housing Authority in providing housing for low and moderate income families and senior citizens;
3. providing limited physical public improvements related to the housing activities;
4. limited economic development improvements;
5. general overall grant administration.

It is estimated the program would begin in August, 1980, following final grant approval by the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development.
