vital role in determining how their tax dollars are spent."

One of the ways Jackson believes we can reduce the financial strain on our overburdened taxpayers is to incorporate the concept of zero-based budgeting in Clackamas County government. Zero-based budgeting would accomplish several things:

1. It would require departments to reassess their allocation of resources.
2. It would encourage a reduced level of spending.
3. It would focus on key policy issues and high priority programs.
4. It would encourage more participation and involvement in budget planning by citizens and managers.

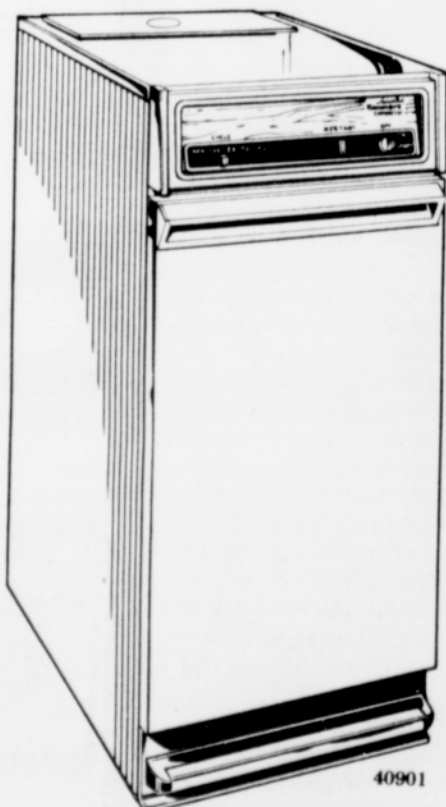
"Each Commissioner must be accountable for certain program areas. Currently, the County Commissioners are responsible for all departments, yet are not accountable for any specific program area," stated Eugene. "Each Commissioner should be assigned to oversee certain departments. Citizens would then know who to contact to resolve a particular problem."

Jackson says he will continually stress the importance of encouraging citizen participation and involvement in local government. "I have always emphasized that if elected your County Commissioner, my door will be open to the public by setting aside at least one day a week to hear and respond to any problems and concerns citizens might have. I will also conduct quarterly Town Hall meetings throughout the county for direct citizen input and recommendations for change. It's only through this two-way communication can any local government leaders insure they are effectively meeting the needs of the people they serve," insisted Jackson.

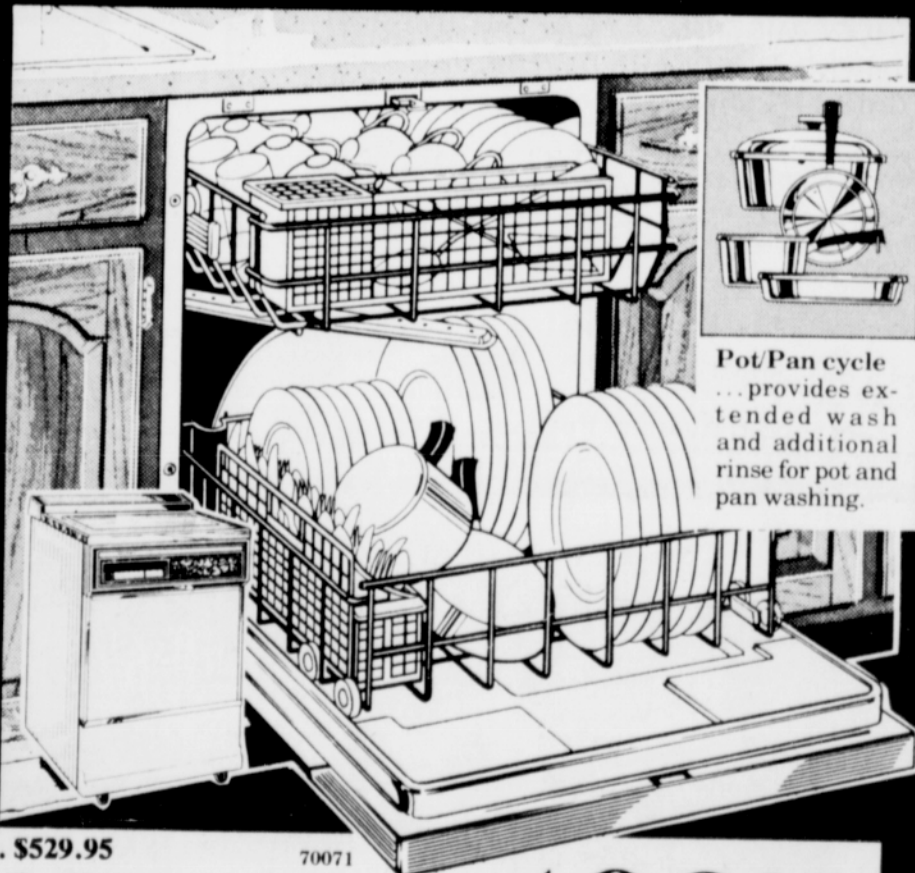

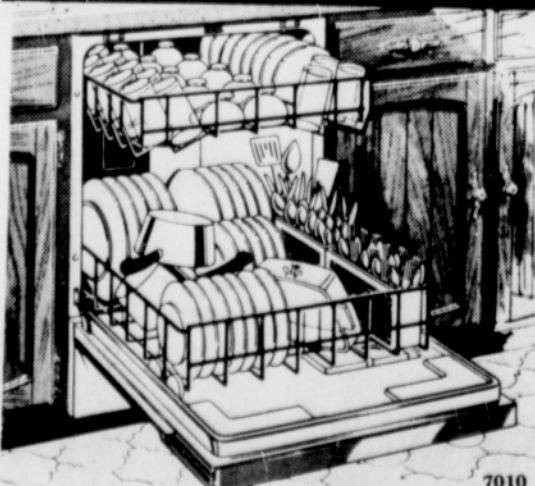
