Artist paints Black scientists

Noted Black artist and illustrator Ernest Crichlow has been commissioned by CIBA-GEIGY Corporation to paint a series of portraits of exceptional Black scientists.

These portraits will be made into posters and distributed by CIBA-GEIGY to schools, colleges and organizations to help commemorate the achievements of Blacks in science and medicine.

The initial series, which consists of three posters, will honor chemist Dr. Percy Julian and physicians Dr. Charles Drew and Dr. Jane Wright.

The late Dr. Julian made significant research contributions in many areas, including the development of a synthetic drug for glaucoma, the discovery of a more economical way to extract sterols from soybean oil for the manufacturing of sex hormones, and the development of a better method of producing cortisone synthetically.

Dr. Drew, who died in 1950, was a pioneer in the field of blood preservation whose research led to the founding of blood banks. In World War II, he organized the blood for Britain project and later directed the first American Red Cross blood bank program.

Dr. Jane Wright is currently professor of surgery at the New

York Medical College. Since 1949, she has specialized in cancer chemotherapy research and was director of the Harlem Hospital Cancer Research Foundation and in charge of the chemotherapy program at New York University Medical Center. She has received numerous honors for her contributions to cancer chemotherapy research.

Crichlow is a New York artist who currently resides in Brooklyn and teaches at the Arts Student's League. He is best known for his penetrating portraits of Black children. He has also illustrated many children's books, including the popular "Two is a Team."

Long-active in helping other Black artists, Crichlow was a founder of the Cinque Gallery in New York, a gallery for young artists from disadvantaged backgrounds. The artist's works have been shown in numerous exhibitions, most recently at a special show at the Corcoran Gallery in Washington, D.C.

In recognition of his contributions to art, Crichlow was one of 10 Black artists commended by President Carter at the White House reception for the National Conference of Artists on April 2.

SA presents concert series

Counselor training available

"If you are 13 or 14 years old, enjoy being with children, want to get some work experience and have fun at the same time, the YWCA may be the place for you this summer," says Paul Nelson, Coordinator for the YWCA Summer Day Camp Program. This summer the YWCA will offer "Counselor-in-training," a new program for 13-14 years olds who would like to combine work experience and fun.

The program will begin on June 16 and continue through August 15. Participants will meet three days a week for two week session at a time. Participants may sign up for as many sessions as they want to. Cost of each two-week session is \$45.

The emphasis of the CIT program will be on training these 13 and 14 year olds in skills that are useful in working with children. The program combines both outdoor camping and backpacking and urban experiences. Participants will also have the opportunity to work first hand with the children enrolled in the YWCA Day Camp.

During each two-week session, the first week will be spent training participants in different skill areas. Some time will be spent backpacking and camping with the emphasis on

learning outdoor survival skills. Time will also be spent in urban environments, exploring all the opportunities within the city and emphasizing the appreciation of urban environments.

The second week of each session will emphasize practical experience. Participants will work directly with the Day Camp children, along with the regular staff counselors.

Says Nelson, "We want to emphasize the idea that this program is meant to be fun. It will give these teenagers a chance to gain valuable work experience, learn some new skills and have fun -- without having to give up the whole summer."

Participants are encouraged to sign up for more than one session as the focus will vary from one week to another, and continued exposure to children is important if you are interested in day camp work. Says Nelson, "Exposure is important. The more experience you have with children, the more you enhance your knowledge of them and increase your chances of finding employment in summer day camp programs in the future."

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held by the Tri-County Metropolitan Transportation District of Oregon (Tri-Met) at the Water Service Building (Auditorium), 1800 S.W. 6th Avenue, Portland, Oregon at 10:30 a.m., Monday, July 14, 1980, for the purpose of considering a project for which financial assistance is being sought from the Urban Mass Transportation Administration, pursuant to the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended generally described as follows:

Tri-Met intends to apply for a combined Section 3 (Capital) and Section 6 (Demonstration) funds to demonstrate and introduce a self-service fare collection system. The grants for analysis, staff training, equipment procurement (ticket printers, validators, and ticket vending machines), enforcement personnel, equipment maintenance personnel, and support elements required to implement the program over a four (4) year period. The self-service system of fare collection will enhance the introduction of higher capacity transit vehicles (articulated buses and LRT) and is anticipated to reduce the cost of operating the transit system in comparison with the conventional fare collection system currently in use.

No persons, families or businesses will be displaced by this project. There will be no significant impact on the environment, and the project is in conformance with and is a part of the Transportation Improvement Program of the Metropolitan Services District (METRO) and is in conformance with the comprehensive land use planning for the urban area. The project is currently under review by the A-95 Clearinghouse.

The estimated cost of the project is approximately \$8,600,000. Federal participation will be approximately \$6,200,000 and the local share will be approximately \$2,400,000.

At the hearing, Tri-Met will afford an opportunity for interested persons or agencies to be heard with respect to the social, economic, and environmental aspects of the project. Interested persons may submit oral or written evidence and recommendations with respect to the project.

A copy of the application for a federal grant for the project, together with an analysis of the environmental impacts of the projects, and the Transit development Program, are available for public inspection at the Tri-Met office, 4012 S.W. 17th Avenue, Portland, Oregon.
