YCC provides summer

"It is a pretty neat place, this YCC camp." O.C. Frazier, 15 years old, Grant High School.

"I'd like to come back next year as a leader." Grey hall, 18 years old Benson High School.

"These young people have learned a lot about getting along with each other." Gideon Abraham, Camp Director.

Clackamas Lake Youth Conservation Camp (YCC) will be home for 40 Portland young men and women for 8 weeks this summer. Located between Timothy and Clackamas Lakes off Skyline Road on the Mt. Hood National Forest, the camp has provided a summer job (3.10/hr), an opportunity to learn about the environment, and a chance to make new friends for these young Portlanders.

At YCC they have made cedar shakes, built fences, maintained the camp, dug out a spring for livestock, and improved habitat for wildlife. Such tasks have provided the young people with meaningful work, and also a chance to learn about themselves. "The opportunity to take responsibility," says Director Abraham, "lets them grow socially. There have been squabbles, but they have dealt with them and solved their problems."

Besides providing work, another major objective is to give the YCC'ers some environmental

education. They have learned to identify different types of trees, calculated how much life a particular stream would support, taken field trips to a lumber mill, and a PGE dam, and visited with a bird of prey expert.

"They get a handon experience," says Cammi Hamilton, Environmental Education Instructor, "and they take class work quite well."

The YCC'ers live in small 5 person cottages segregated by sex. Each YCC has a cot, sleeping bag, and foot locker. At the end of the row of cottages is a trailer with men and women's bathrooms. Two cooks provide substantial meals to keep the YCC'ers going on their busy schedule of working and learning. And oh yes, there is recreation, too. There have been volleyball tournaments, dances, swimming and


