Front pulls upset

The Black United Front Ghetto All-Stars, a collection of current and former college basketball players and a newly created barnstorming team trounced Piedmont Friends Church last Friday by the score of 131-106. Then on the following Sunday, the All-Stars averaged an earlier loss to KBOO-FM by spanking the listener supported station 120-99.

In the first game, the All-Stars awesome frontline of Gary Von Wadden, a 6'10, 220 pound center from the University of Portland and 6'8, 245 pound power forward Quinton Braxton (former Pilot cager) dominated the backboards while Jose Slaughter, Ullysses Tucker, and super quick Jerry Peterson filled the lanes as they zipped to a 68-33 halftime lead.

Braxton and Slaughter lead the charge with 13 points while Ullysses Tucker added nine. Also contributing greatly off the bench was Donald Dixon who "shook and took" for nine points and James Ferguson pumped in nine big points. Jerry Peterson had eight first half assists and eight points. Von Wadden chipped in ten boards and seven points.

The All-Stars started the second half the same way they ended the first. After a nasty, rim skaking, crowd screaming, hand slapping, two handed slam dunk by University of Portland All-American Jose Slaughter and a length of the court drive and slam by Gary Von Wadden, the scoreboard spouted a 89-50 score. Piedmont immediately called time out with 10:21 left in the game.

From that point on, the All-Stars relaxed and were outscored 56-42 as Marvin Patten, James Johnson, and big Bobby Flowers finally found their basketball skills.

Slaughter ripped three dunks, Von Wadden two, and Ullysses Tucker also rose to the occasion. Von Wadden also grabbed 17 rebounds while his board buddy Quinton Braxton gangstered 15 rebounds. Von Wadden was the only white player on the Black United Front's team.

High scorers in the game were Jose Slaughter, a sure first round draft pick in next year's NBA draft with 28 points, Ferguson 17, Dixon 16, and Peterson had 13 points while

Dishing out 17 assists. Donald Dixon, the former Pilot star also found the range in the assist department by passing out 15. He also had seven steals.

Against KBOO, the All-Stars came out mad because most of them wanted to be in front of the television watching the seventh game of the Boston-Philly series. They took out their frustrations on the radio station by taking a quick 20-2 lead with 17:13 left in the first half. After a time out by KBOO-FM, the All-Stars jumped to a 36-7 lead and the score stood 55-32 at the half.

Two months ago, KBOO-FM pulled off a 111-107 victory over the All-Stars in a benefit for the station and the Front. Since then, the Front has picked up a couple of fine players in Ferguson, Von Wadden, Dixon, Peterson, and Slaughter. Tucker and Braxton were the only holdovers from the first game.

The second half resembled a basketball clinic with Donald "Tricky" Dixon leading the break and dishing out assists to everyone. He finished with 13 assists. High scorers in the game were Jose Slaughter and Quinton Braxton with 27 points while Gary Von Wadden and Ullysses Tucker each chipped in 16 points. Von Wadden also had 18 rebounds.

After the game, Rick Mitchell, player-coach for the KBOO team made the following comment:

"We didn't expect the Front to come in this strong. Last time we handled them pretty easy but it was different this time. We started off very slow and missed some easy shots. You've got to give the Front credit because they really controlled the middle and the boards. Now we want a rubber match."

Ron Hunt led KBOO with 20 points and 13 rebounds.

The All-Stars, playing only their third game, are interested in playing any time in Portland. In that game against Piedmont Friends Church the proceeds went to the "Task Force in Atlanta" to help them find the killer/killers of the young Blacks there. The proceeds from the KBOO game were split between the radio station and the Front. Those wishing to play the Black United Front for a worthy cause should call 286-3426.
