however, social and economic pressures are particularly harsh on minorities at this time. Blacks and Hispanics are in need of specialized Commissions that can conduct research and recommend intervention strategies. The legislature should be more responsive to the needs of those two population groups and fund the Commission at reasonable

(Continued from Page 1 Col 6) most susceptible to health problems.

Decreased funds for these preventive programs will lead to increased health problems, which will lead to increased costs to the public. Speaking of costs, it is important to remember that the federal budget for the military is about three times the amount spent on social and health services.

In 1980 world military expenditures amounted to over \$500 billion, or \$1.4 billion daily. By comparison, the cost of totally eradicating smallpox was less than that for six hours of the arms race. Less than a day's military expenditures could finance the entire malaria-control program of the World Health Organization. (Malaria kills one million children a year in Africa.) Our government provides more funds for the construction of a single battleship than for cancer research.

The proper response to valid criticism of the health sector is to redirect current programs so that they better serve their intended purposes. For us to allow such cuts in services requires a denial once again, an inability to understand or recognize what it is like to be poor

spend most of our time and income struggling to avoid illness and despair, it requires the denial of something more fundamental -- the reality that the suffering of others affects and diminishes us.

Some people ask why physicians, as health experts, should ber heard on these issues. First, the health effects of nuclear war have been denied and distorted to make war more acceptable as a solution to global conflicts. This is insane. Second, the impact of cutting social services would be devastating to the public's health. Third, the health of the nation is threatened by both these policies. They must be exposed and altered as a preventative health measure. This is a situation in which prevention is the only effective therapy. Finally, the health implications of these issues are so profound and frightening that immediate, undistorted attention to them (an end to the denial) will be dramatically effective in altering this nation's course away from selfdestruction

Picket McCoy home

want as many Blacks as possible in one district because if you have us spread out, it limits the number of Blacks who vote because they find their vote doesn't mean anything."

Asked why the demonstrators chose to personalize the issue by picketing McCoy's home, Herndon said, "Too long people who are suppose to represent us have gotten off lightly and McCoy is one of the most tragic examples of this. He has not represented this community. If he disagreed with what the Black community wanted, he should have come to us and said, 'I disagree.' "

Amidst the chant of "Who's Bill McCoy, he's the white man's boy," there was a scattering of support for McCoy. One youthful supporter said, "McCoy has a voice for all the people in this area. A lot of people around here are white and these picketers are from the N.E. side, and they think that he should have a voice for them too, but he has a voice for everybody.'

Two people passing by added: McCoy is a fine fellow and a good legislator. Gladys is a good Commissioner. You people should be happy you got them there." Among his most vocal support, whose counter chant was "He's my friend and Bill McCoy is color blind," was Dennis McCormack who said,"I think McCoy has Black people in mind in everything he does. Although, I vote for him as a white because he takes care of me, too. I have empathy with all people that feel they have a reason to march, and I just want them to know that I like Bill McCoy.'

Toward the end of the demonstration, Herndon addressed the crowd. "This is not something we looked forward too, but the day is long passed when people who are supposed to speak for us can go down and say and do things that do not represent the community or our

The reaction of McCoy's neighbors was very stand-offish as they stood outside their homes and watched. It was reported that a State Patrolman was inside the Mc-Coy home. Bill McCoy was unavail-

able for comment and the reaction from members of his family who responded, was predictably hostile. When asked by Grassroot News for a statement, one of his sons remarked that he didn't want to lower himself by commenting on the demonstration. Another son characterized the demonstration as a circus and engaged in a staring match with various demonstrators.

A relative of the McCoys called the demonstrators "Black Klans-
