

Their answers prompted us to create ads about our efforts to develop alternative and renewable energy resources.


The ads also offered free booklets and advice on small hydro, wind, solar and geothermal energy.

And judging by the response, there are a lot of people interested in energy.

After the ad on small hydro power, people identified 33 potential small dam sites that we never knew existed. And we're also evaluating an additional 150 sites in our service area. Many of the sites are being studied to see just how much electricity each can generate.

The ad on wind power created a flurry of 877 requests for our free wind power booklet. At last count, customers have installed 10 small wind-powered generators for a total capacity of more than 20 kilowatts.

Additionally, our wind-powered generator at Whiskey Run on the Southern Oregon coast has produced over 7500 kilowatt hours in the first quarter of operation, providing valuable data on large-scale wind generation project sites.

Over 200 people asked for information on Passive Solar homes after we ran the ad on solar power. At least 4 homes are being built with our Passive Solar design guidelines in Oregon, Wyoming and California. These homes will act as living laboratories to test how effective Passive Solar designs can be in reducing heating costs.

Our ad on geothermal power helped get people all steamed up about using the energy from the earth's heat here in Oregon.

To help bring the energy of the sun, wind and earth on-line sooner, we created our own Renewable Energy Department. By evaluating each site on a project-by-project basis, we can see whether it will be better for us to develop a site or purchase the energy from an independent project developer.

Other alternative resources, such as wood-fired cogeneration of electricity, will help bridge the energy gap by using renewable resources effectively.

But the most important resource available to all of us is still conservation. With help from our programs, people can continue to save energy and use all our resources more wisely.
