Sunshine provides clothes

The Portland Police Bureau will provide \$60 worth of new clothing for 500 needy children in the Portland middle schools this fall.

This program is made possible by a grant from the Police Bureau's Sunshine Division and the assistance of Fred Meyer, Inc.

The Police Bureau's Community Juvenile Officer (CJO) Program, already established in Portland's middle schools, will administer the

clothing program.

With the assistance of a CJO, selected 6th, 7th and 8th grade students will be able to select \$60 worth of new clothing at a Fred Meyer store.

Students in need of a one time "emergency" clothing outfit will be identified by school principals, teachers and CJO's. Parental consent is also required for participation in the program.
