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## This week at Portland Meadows

Four different jockeys scored riding doubles during the second weekend of racing. On Friday, November 6, Greg Swaim won with Facetheruler in the fifth race and Nose on Wire in the ninth. Swaim is currently Portland Meadows' leading rider with six victories in 26 mounts, and three of his wins have come in quarter horse races. Thus far, Swaim is the only jockey to win three times on the same race card, having done that on November 1.

Saturday, John Ishihara, who was third in the 1980-81 final standings, scored a double with victories aboard Sy's Jester in the fifth race and Colorfast in the 11th.

Two jockeys posted doubles on Sunday, Troy Grissom and Senon Trevino. The 26-year-old Grissom, who was the third leading jockey at the 1981 Longacres meet with 73 victories, won aboard Shadow's Pleasure in the second event and Rogue Lark (a 17-to-1 shot) in the 10th.

Trevino, who is making a comeback at the age of 39, came on strong toward the end of the card with wins on Newpet in the featured eighth race and Oui Farrah in the ninth.

Bill Tollett posted the only training double during the second weekend of racing, winning with favored Nice Conversation in the third race and Gourmet Grits in the seventh.

The double helped pull Tollett, who was sixth in the 1980-81 Portland trainer standings, into a first place tie on the 1981-82 list with veteran Bud Klokstad. Both conditioners have three victories through six days of racing.

## The week of November 13, 14, 15

The fifth running of the Beaver State Handicap Saturday, November 14, highlights Portland Meadows third weekend of racing.

The Beaver State, which carries a purse of \$8,500-added, pits two-year-olds at six furlongs, is one of the preps for the \$25,000-added Oregon Futurity, to be run Saturday, December 12. The race also should give Northwest racing followers a pretty good idea of which horse will emerge as the favorite in the Bill Wineberg Futurity on Sunday, November 29.

Last season, Ralph Garcia guided Son of Thunderhawk to victory in the Beaver State, which offered a total purse of \$9,825. Most recently, the Oregon-bred three-year-old finished second in a \$40,000 claiming race at Bay Meadows.

Portland Meadows enters its third weekend of racing with an average daily attendance of 5,078, up two per cent over the first six days of the 1980-81 season. The 1981-82 per race mutuel handle at the North Portland oval is up 7.4 per cent over last season.

Post time for Friday's 10-race program is 7:30 p.m. Saturday's and Sunday's 11-race cards start at 1:30 p.m.

## Cell Talk

Excerpts from the Attorney General's Task Force on Violent Crimes, Final Report, August 17, 1981:

The public is well aware that crime has reached alarming proportions in American society. Many, if not most, citizens now take precautions, such as routinely locking doors and avoiding certain areas, that were unheard of in earlier generations. The public, however, is not as aware of one of the hidden substrata of the serious crime epidemic, namely the crime taking place in a substantial number of our schools. Our definition of crime in the schools does not include routine disciplinary problems, pranks, and vandalism that have always been present in public schools in varying degrees. Rather, we refer to those schools that today are confronted with gangs, law-violating youth groups, and individual students and non-students engaged in a wide variety of offenses. Drug-dealing, burglary, robbery, larceny, extortion and assault are commonplace in many schools and on school grounds. A 1976-77 national survey by the National Institute of Education reported these findings:

The risk of violence to teenage youngsters is greater in school than elsewhere. Two-thirds of all robberies and half of all assaults committed on youths age 12-15 occurred at school.

About 6,700 schools were seriously affected by crime.

An estimated 282,000 students were physically attacked while at school in a typical one-month period; nearly half the attacks resulted in some injury.

In a typical month an estimated 112,000 students had something taken from them by force, threat of force, or by use of a weapon.

About 5,200 teachers were physically attacked each month.

While it is generally agreed that the high level of drug abuse and crime is a relatively recent phenomenon, there is no clear consensus concerning the factors that have caused it or its widespread and extensive nature. No one doubts,

however, that an atmosphere dominated by drugs, extortion, robbery, assault, rape, and other serious crimes is not conducive to academic achievement. Yet the problem persists, and school officials seem either unable or unwilling to deal with it so that education can take place in an atmosphere where both students and teachers do not fear for their physical safety.

Despite the exceptional amount of crime that exists in the public schools, it is not entirely clear that law enforcement and the community are fully aware of the extent of the problem. We believe that, at a minimum, the public must be made aware of the difficulties educators face each day because of the incidence of crime in the public schools. To that end, we recommend that the Attorney General assume the responsibility of informing the American public as to the extent of the problem of drug abuse and violent crime in the public schools. Further, we recommend that the Attorney General seek a national consensus that drug abuse, crime, and violence have no rightful place in the schools, and that vigorous law enforcement is essential when conditions warrant.

In making this recommendation, we are mindful that ensuring an effective public school system is primarily the responsibility of states and local communities. We are not suggesting that the Attorney General attempt to assume responsibility for policing the schools. Rather, because violent crime and narcotics use in the schools is a serious national problem, we believe the Attorney General's leadership in publicizing the problem will encourage local communities and law enforcement personnel to deal directly and effectively with crime in the schools.



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
