## PCC considers Adams

(Continued from page 1 col. 6) junior level.

Cascade was originally purchased with Model Cities funds during the late 1960s, and opened with the goal of serving the inner NE community.

"It was for neighborhood residents to get an education," Edna Robertson, coordinator of the N.E. Neighborhoods Office, recalled. Saying she's not opposed to the possible trade "if it's going to offer the community better subjects and classes," Ms. Robertson, however, wants local input on any decision.

"I would like to know what neighborhood residents would like," she said. "Adams is not completely out of our area. Concordia is one of our neighborhoods, but if they went much farther, they'd be completely out of Northeast."

Concern that Cascade's facilities

would no longer be available to local residents are laid to rest by Dean Van Dyke.

"We've told community leaders if we acquired Adams, we wouldn't close the Cascade site. We're not saying the only way we'll talk to them [the School District] is on trade."

Dr. Anthony also hinted at other possibilities for Cascade. "We don't want to abandon that community. We'd work with the community to find uses. Maybe a retail park..." he said.

Anthony added that the School District "may or may not want Cascade. Right now it's a blank tablet."

"At the stage we're in now," said Van Dyke, "we have expressed interest in the Adams site. The trade is in their [PPS'] ballpark."

Efforts to reach School District

Acting Superintendent James Fenwick or other district spokespersons for comments on a possible trade were unsuccessful.

Fenwick, however, in a memorandum to School Board members Jan. 22, acknowledged "speculation" about such a trade, and indicated he will make separate recommendations to the Board "in the near future."

Attached to the memorandum is a comparison of advantages to disadvantages in (1) keeping Adams under district ownership, and possibly locating Columbia/Whitaker Middle School there, and (2) leasing Adams to Portland Community College. "This option keeps title to Adams, but allows for a long-term lease of the building and site," the memorandum read. "Portland Community College has made a specific overture for a long-term lease."

this money wasted, like the extensive remodeling done at Washington/Monroe shortly before it was closed?

•Are the objections to the Eliot site by some board members politically motivated? Are they still reacting to the termination of Dr. Blanchard by attempting to save his model program—Eliot ECE? Or are they merely attempting to save it for the middle class white students that attend Eliot, at the expense of 400 Black middle school students who still do not have their school?

Board member Herb Cawthorne said the Board does not have sensitivity to the needs of the Black community and applies a "double standard," bending over backward to help and accommodate other middle schools but not considering the community when considering Tubman.

He opposed a delay in the decision, saying if the Board is not going to consider the desires of the leadership of the community it should go ahead and make a decision.

The Board was not concerned about attendance patterns or racial balance when it closed Adams and Washington/Monroe, so should not use that as an excuse to delay a decision in Tubman, he added.

Dean Gisvold was concerned about the long range effects on racial balance and use of buildings and that these issues should be settled first.

Charlotte Beeman would like to have a full-scale discussion and decision on policy on racial balance and on use of excess property prior to a decision on Tubman. The Board has plans to address its racial balance policy late this spring since its Comprehensive Desegregation

Plan and its desegregation policy are contradictory.

Cawthorne responded that the Eliot site was selected in April of 1980 and the entire community supported that location. To go back now and go through the process again is unjustified.

Bill Scott said he considers Tubman to be part of the desegregation plan that has not been implemented and he is ready to proceed without further policy discussion.

Frank McNamara was opposed to the Eliot site when it was selected and still is opposed.

The Board decided to obtain additional information on the seven potential sites—Adams, Washington/Monroe, old Monroe, Boise, Eliot, Jefferson—and to decide on February 8th whether to make a decision, to take a community poll, or hold a public hearing, or all of the above.

## Behind the 'Libyan hit squad' rumor

While rhetorically the Arab hardliners ridiculed the Fahd plan, behind the scenes all three were sending signals to the West and the moderate Arab states. Though threatened by a new outbreak of hostilities with Iran, Iraq volunteered to resume sending oil to the West. Syria has taken almost one billion dollars from Saudi Arabia since last April. And in early November, Khadafy withdrew all his forces from neighboring Chad, thus relieving tensions with Egypt and Sudan, which felt directly threatened.

Just before the joint U.S.-Egyptian "Bright Star" military maneuvers began, Mubarak pulled Egyptian forces away from the Libyan border as a gesture to Khadafy. Khadafy is popular with many Egyptians, especially the rising Islamic fundamentalists. Many view him as a disciple of Gamal Abdul Nasser, whose image—in contrast to Sadat—remains positive a decade

after his death.

Israel has every reason to fear the worst of all possible scenarios: that the "moderate" and the "radical" Arab states are drawing together. So long as the Arab world remained divided, Israel's security was not that threatened. But Arab unity could mean the gravest threat to Israel since the establishment of the state in 1948.

Significantly, it has been Libya that has backed off the most from its earlier radical policies. As U.S. oil company employees all said on leaving Libya, they had no serious problems there and would return if U.S. policy changed. The French government officially commented that it believed Col. Khadafy had turned away from his earlier policies of abetting terrorism.

On December 11, the OPEC nations, with Libya playing a leading role, decided unanimously to reduce oil prices by 20-70 cents a barrel for 1982. This decision, coming after the breakup of the Fez meeting and

President Reagan's order to Americans to leave Libya, indicated no particular concern over the U.S. threats. This was in sharp contrast to OPEC's behavior during the October 1973 war when they hiked oil prices some 400 per cent.

Ironically, the threat of war so clear in Washington's actions towards Libya may in fact have been a stern warning not just to Col. Khadafy, but especially to Prime Minister Begin, to cease and desist from further warlike actions.

Many expenses incurred in a job-related move may be deductible on 1981 income tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service advises.

Moving expenses which can be deducted include the cost of travel to the new location; moving of household goods and personal effects; pre-move, house-hunting trips; temporary living costs at the new location; and certain expenses related to the disposition of an old residence and acquisition of a new one.

The maximum deduction for these last three items is \$3,000. In addition, the distance between a taxpayer's new job and old home must be at least 35 miles farther than the former home was from the former job. A taxpayer who is an employee must work for at least 39 weeks during the 12 months after the move.

Eligible taxpayers can claim the moving expense deduction whether they itemize deductions or not. Expenses are reported on Form 3903, "Moving Expense Adjustment," which should be filed with Form 1040.
