South Africans seek freedom

"Congressman Ron Wyden, who represents most Black people in Portland, has refused to support the policies of African liberation groups," Ron Herndon said. "It is obvious that big business and politicians in Oregon only give lip service to the idea of human rights for Black people in South Africa. While these groups condemn and punish Poland, Black people in South Africa have suffered under martial law and the most inhuman forms of injustice for decades. The message is clear, justice is something reserved for white people."

Isaacs added, "The United States has repeatedly exercised its right to veto United Nations sanctions against the white regime. The concern of the U.S. has been the maintenance of economics. This supports institutionalized violence and oppression in South Africa."

The Pan Africanist Congress is one of the two United Nations recognized liberation movements that

are fighting South African colonialism. The PAC is waging a national liberation struggle to liberate Azania from white settlers colonized their land, renaming it "South Africa."

Isaacs has been an active and leading participant in the Azanian struggle for many years. He was president of the Student Representative Council at the University of the Western Cape when efforts to repress the student movement resulted in the expulsion of the entire student body and the closing of the university. As a founding member of the South African Student Organization (SASO), the forerunner of the Black Consciousness Movement, he played a leading role in the growing African nationalist movement within South Africa. He served as SASO's vice-president in 1972, and its president in 1973, when he was banned, placed under house arrest, and then imprisoned. Since his exile from Azania, Isaacs has become the Chief Representative of

the PAC's Permanent Observer Mission at the United Nations and Director of Foreign Affairs for the central committee of the PAC.

"I reject completely the idea that the struggle in South Africa is a struggle between Communism and anti-Communism or a struggle between Black and white—it's a struggle of right and wrong. It is a struggle of life and death."

Most recently, the PAC has been strengthened by the release from Robben Island prison of Nyati Pokela, who was elected chairman of the PAC after completing a 13-year prison term. Recent articles in the South African press have warned that because of Chairman Pokela's unifying leadership South Africa must prepare itself for what they call "a new onslaught."

"In order to effect reasonable change, there must be redistribution of wealth and power," Isaacs added. "Our orientation is in the interest of the freedom of our people."
