

Refugee program extended

The City's Refugee Program, implemented in 1981, has just received its second year grant award in the amount of \$54,000.

Two coordinators have been hired to direct the Refugee Program. Bruce Thowpaou Bliatout, former Executive Director of the Refugee Orientation Center, will serve as city liaison to community groups. Sara G. Cogan, a former employee with the City's Bureau of Economic Development, will coordinate refugee affairs with other local governments.

The coordinators will focus on the 1982-83 program goals which are (1) to strengthen the role of local

government in refugee policy development, (2) to strengthen resettlement efforts at the neighborhood level, (3) to coordinate activities with other agencies collecting and analyzing data regarding refugee arrivals and needs (4) to expand public education, programs and orientation efforts for agency staffs, neighborhoods and interested members of the community, and (5) to provide increased technical assistance in economic development for refugees by enlisting support from local business and financial institutions.

Hall heads church school

Alex Hall, supervisor for Rose's Viennese Bakery, has been elected school board chairman for the Northeast Christian Preschool and Day Care Center, 5209 N.E. 22nd.

The school, initially established by the Northeast Assembly of God congregation, was re-opened three years ago by the Sharon Seventh-day Adventist Church as a community service. The center provides pre-school, kindergarten, day care and latch-key programs for children of all social and ethnic groups in the Northeast Portland area.

Taking over leadership for the center at a time when governmental subsidies have been cut and public schools are offering free programs for 4 and 5 year olds will be a real challenge for Hall. believe you should put a person in for punishment only. If you try to punish a person you make that person more hostile and vengeful in terms of wanting to commit a crime again to get back at the system. To deter a person from committing a crime again we should institute a learning-skills type of program. We should not let them sit and do nothing but warehouse them. We should teach them something so they may utilize it on the outside. The punishment comes from being incarcerated because we have restricted that person's movements

and that is punishment in itself. When you take human beings out of their environment that they are used to and put them in a restricted environment where they cannot move, you have already punished them."

The rubber hose, shaved heads, and beatings bear no weight with Lt. Pool and the staff of Claire Argow. She believes in treating the female inmates with respect and honesty. "In return they will respect and be honest with you. We let you know from the very beginning that we are going to treat you like a human being."

takes up to ten months to get a building permit. "That discourages progress."

Shadburne said a permit should be issued within thirty days of filling out an application at the Planning Bureau unless there is a problem. "When you come into the County's Planning Bureau now, you're not treated very nicely; there are lots of hassles."

The only potential source of money Shadburne sees is the sales tax, which "is not constitutionally possible until 1984." Shadburne favors a sales tax only if there is no property

tax, would "set a low limit" and would eliminate food and drugs to lessen impact on the lower income. In his opinion, Ballot Measure 3, the 1 1/2% property tax limitation measure, will pass in November. Shadburne stated that he voted against the tax base; "It added insult to injury with the 1 1/2% measure on the ballot to ask for taxes at the same time."

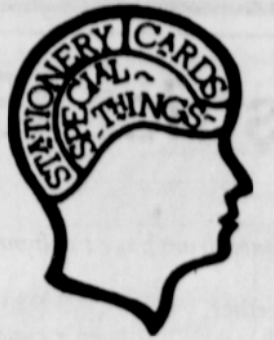
Shadburne added that his problem with a progressive income tax is that "it destroys productivity and discourages the right to own property." Landlords, he said, "are given a disincentive for improving properties."

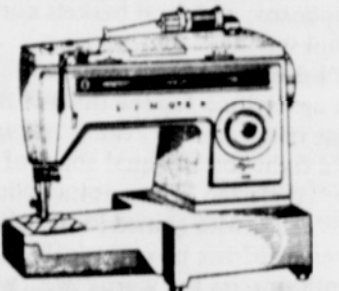
