## Nat Adderly at Jazz De Opus

The Nat Adderly Quintet will be featured at the Jazz de Opus and Opus Too on Sunday, November 7th, at 5:00 and 9:00 p.m.

Adderly, cornetist, composer, educator and lecturer—has been an important participant in the jazz scene for a quarter-century and is considered to be one of the pioneers of modern jazz.

In the early '50s he played in an Army band of which his brother, "Cannonball," was leader, and spent his free time sitting in with jazz and blues groups which were developing bebop sounds. After the Army he graduated from Florida A&M, then went with the Lionel Hampton band. The Adderly brothers formed their first professional quintet and when the group disbanded Nat joined J.J. Johnson and then Woody Herman.

The brothers reunited in 1959 in the Cannonball Adderly Quintet, one of

the most popular groups in jazz history.

In recent years Nat has toured the U.S., Europe and Japan, playing and teaching music. He also acted in "Mahalia," an off-Broadway production based on the life of singer Mahalia Jackson.

Featured with Adderly is Sonny Fortune, one of the finest alto saxophonists anywhere. Fortune, a band leader in his own right, is sounding even better than he did in the early '70s when he helped McCoy Tyner make some of the more memorable music of that decade. He still blows hot and fast, bending notes in all the curls and elegance of Ellington's patented language.

Billy Cobb is featured on drums, Walter Booker on string bass, and Larry Willis, piano.

Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune

(1875 - 1955)

One of the greatest women America has produced, Mary McLeod Bethune rose from a position as field hand picking cotton in South Carolina where she was born to one as advisor, confidante and friend of Pres. and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt. She served as Roosevelt's director of the Negro Division of the National Youth Administration and was a familiar sight at the White House where she always pleaded for justice for Blacks. Almost single-handedly she built Bethune-Cookman College in Florida, an institution whose graduates number in the thousands.
