## City plans urban service policy

The city of Portland has released a proposed Urban Services Policy which will be the topic of a public hearing by the City Council on December 9th. The Urban League of Portland will host a public meeting on December 7th to review and discuss the policy.

The purpose of the proposed policy is to "clarify the City's appropriate role in providing municipal services such as water, sewers, police and fire protection, woods and parks, to the urbanized, unincorporated area around Portland."

In 1980 approximately 150,000 county residents live in urban developments outside of incorporated cities, especially in the area between Portland and Gresham. The existence of these areas affects the people living within the City of Portland.

•Some services are provided by

unincorporated areas also-a form of "double taxation."

•The City of Portland contains tax-exempt property that is used by all county residents-the Courthouse, government offices, parks, libraries, ets.-placing a larger tax burden on the remaining taxable property. In Portland over 20 percent of the property is tax exempt.

•The effects of inadequate services in unincorporated areas can spill over and affect the people of the City.

•Research has shown that fractured metropolitan areas have comparatively poor economic growth because they are unable to plan effectively. Portland makes up 25 percent of the region's population and is declining.

The proposed policty states that the City will:

•Establish and maintain service boundaries that define the portion

•Provide services outside that area only when this enhances the City's ability to serve its own residents:

·Coordinate with other jurisdictions.

The proposed boundaries, which required an amendment to the City comprehensive plan, are: the Columbia River and Washington State line on the North; the Urban Growth Boundary on the Northwest; the Washington County line on the West; the Clackamas County line on the south; to the east to include the Johnson Creek drainage basins.

The Urban League meeting will be held December 7th, 6 p.m., at the Urban League Office, 5329 N.E. Union, Room 218. The City Council hearing will be held on December 9th (248-4135 for information).


