MICHELLE PROPHET

SHE HAS IT all—beauty, brains and personality—a winning combination for whatever she attempts. Michelle Prophet: college student, part-time fashion model, full-time daughter to Matthew and Freddie Prophet, and babysitter to three Prophet sons, 23, 25, and 28 years old.

Michelle spends her week days bending over her accounting books at Oregon State University with full intention of being graduated in early 1985. She expects to be a CPA someday. She also expects to attend summer school on the campus to pick up on one or two different subjects that interest her. Meanwhile, the world of fashion finds Michelle an enchanting model and she offers come rolling in (is it any wonder when you look at her?) from Meier and Frank, from Nordstrom, from Pendleton, Jantzen and Nike to do in-store or runway shows for them. Nearly every weekend finds her on the road to Portland or the vicinity.

She is on the national board of directors for Electrical Women's Round Table, and is a member of The Links, Inc.

Mrs. Jones also is chairman of the Oregon State Board of Agriculture; Chairman of the Multnomah County Cancer Crusade and a member of the Willamette View Manor Board of Directors. She's a fund raiser too. She's been a United Way Loaned Executive, and has led campaign teams for YMCA, OMSI and Emanuel Hospital Children's Wing.

Living in Gladstone, Jones sings regularly in the sanctuary choir of Oak Grove United Methodist Church.

In her speech at the Oregon Merit Mother luncheon in Salem on Wednesday, March 23, Mrs. Jones gave equal credit to her husband's encouragement to his children in their efforts at achieving the goals they set for themselves.

Dorothy Ackerman McClelland, another 1983 Oregon Merit Mother, had as her sponsor group the Portland Urban Indian Council for which she serves as president.
