

Business Notes

Some 10,000 metal trades workers struck shipyards along the West Coast last week because of a breakdown in contract negotiations.

An impasse was reached Saturday night in talks between union negotiators and the Pacific Shipbuilder's Association, said Clarence Briggs, executive secretary of the Pacific Coast District Metal Trades Council.

The council is composed of 11 unions whose members are employed by nine shipbuilding and ship repair companies in the ports of Oakland, San Francisco, Seattle, Portland and Tacoma.

No vote of confidence in the effectiveness of five of the major U.S. business associations among top-level corporate leaders, whose opinions were asked by pollster Lou Harris. Business groups listed were Business Roundtable, U.S. Chamber of Commerce, National Association of Manufacturers, American Business Conference, Federation of Independent Business. Highest "very effective" rating went to Roundtable, but that was only 16 percent. Others got 10, 7, 3, 2 percent respectively. All did fair-to-middling in the "somewhat effective" category. Under "hardly effective" Roundtable showed up best with 16 percent again, others in order got 34, 31, 30, 32 percent.

The Oregon Forest Products Transportation Association voted unanimously Sunday to begin a referendum drive to overturn the recently enacted 2-cent state gasoline tax.

The truckers will attempt to collect more than 42,000 signatures to place the gas tax issue on the November 1984 general election ballot. Voters have rejected similar gas and weight-mile taxes in recent years. The Legislature approved the increases but did not include a referral to voters.

The first increase of 1 cent would go into effect Jan. 1, 1984, with the second penny added a year later. Truck weight-mile taxes would go up 13 percent each year under the legislative proposal.

The owners of a restaurant near an auto plant have sold their foreign-made Volvo to end a month-long boycott by assembly workers who wanted them to drive an American-made model.

Business at Anna's Family Restaurant in suburban Cincinnati dropped after workers at a General Motors Corp. plant a block away discovered that the owners drove a Swedish-made Volvo.

The Reagan Administration recently appeared before Congress and asked that the federal income tax be applied to a portion of employer-paid health insurance benefits. For a single individual, employer-paid health insurance premiums greater than \$70 per month would be considered taxable income of the employee. This would mean higher taxes for an estimated 30 million workers.

The Reagan Administration also testified in favor of new taxes on other employee benefits, such as discounts on merchandise for company employees.

The full amount of the deposit will be refunded if documents are returned in good condition within ten (10) days after the bid opening.

This project is partially financed through the Community Development Block Grant Program with funds obtained from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Contract will be subject to regulations of the Departments of Labor and Housing and Urban Development.

Attention is called to ORS chapter 279 and State or Federal provisions for Equal Employment Opportunity, Affirmative Action, HUD Section 3 Requirements, and the minimum salary and wages as set forth in the Contract Documents.

Bidders must be prequalified with the City of Cornelius in compliance with Chapter 279 of Oregon Revised Statutes.

Proposals must be made upon the proposal forms bound in the Contract Documents and must be accompanied by a certified check or bid payable to the City of Cornelius in an amount not less than ten percent (10%) of the total amount bid.

The City of Cornelius reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, waive any informalities, and to accept the proposal that best serves the interests of the City. Bids cannot be withdrawn within thirty (30) days after the actual date of bid opening.
