

Business Notes

Marijuana, everyone agrees, is now the state's largest cash crop and the harvest is coming in. Oregon's marijuana crop is estimated to be worth \$400 to \$500 million, according to Oregon State Police Lt. J.A. Forney. Much of it is found in southwestern Oregon, and state police estimate that half is found on U.S. Bureau of Land Management property.

The Black-founded and managed Schowan County Credit Union is establishing a revolving loan fund for worker cooperatives, with an initial targeted capitalization of \$300,000. Loans will be made for equipment, buildings, etc.: the first projected recipient is a worker-owned casket factory in Tillery, North Carolina. Schowan's fund is modeled on one developed by the Industrial Cooperative Association headquartered in Somerville, Massachusetts. Contributions to the Schowan fund are being sought now. In addition to aiding economic democracy, such contributions will be insured by an agency of the federal government and will earn interest. California, which generally leads the nation in fads and faddists, recently introduced the "Phone In-Drive Thru" supermarket in Los Angeles. Primarily for people with neither the time nor inclination to wheel a shopping cart up and down supermarket aisles, the service permits you to phone in an order and then drive by three hours later — or even the next day, if you wish — to pick it up.

Ron Cameron, 41, one of the founders of Phone In-Drive Thru Markets, says: "The average shopper spends 49 minutes in a supermarket. Under our system, it can take as little as two minutes. Our members phone in their orders from our catalog, which contains some 4000 items. Three hours later, they drive by and pick up their groceries."

The 70-year-old chairwoman of the board of Hudson Oil Co., Inc., Mary Hudson Vandergrift, has been fined \$5,000 and ordered to perform 200 hours of public service work for ordering gasoline pumps rigged to short customers at company stations. She was placed on two years probation by a judge in Kansas Tuesday. The company, which has stations in 31 states, also was assessed an additional \$5,500 for altering the pumps so they pumped less gas than motorists paid for.

Oregon unemployment up

The downward trend of Oregon's seasonally adjusted unemployment rates, which began last November, was broken in July when the rates moved back up sharply to 9.9%. This is .8 of a percentage point above the June level. In contrast, the national rate fell by half a percentage point between June and July.

The Oregon Diffusion Index, a measure of future employment growth gave a mirror-image of the unemployment rate by dropping from 57.4 in June to 50.8 in July.

The dominant influence on the July unemployment figure is the unexpected flatness of employment in many industries which normally show seasonal increases between June and July.

The education sector showed decreases of 28,200 between June

and July. Education employment, which normally declines after the summer closure of schools, dropped further than expected as a shrinking education dollar and budget uncertainty among local school districts cancelled some summer activities.

One industry, Food and Kindred Products, which normally shows substantial employment gains at this time of year only increased slightly.

Lumber and Wood Products showed no change in employment between June and July. However, it was still 7,300 above July of 1982.

Construction showed a comparatively large increase between June and July; +1,100. But this still leaves the industry 2,600 below last year and the increase in employment was 200 less than expected.
