there is a wolf in sheep's clothing. We cannot afford to forget."

La Guardia said the compromise was a limited victory for MHRC and "we've found out that there is not a lot of regard in City Hall for all we've done. Margaret paid some political price. Business Notes

Domestic automakers reported Tuesday that sales rose 24.9 percent in August, despite dealer complaints of car shortages, while total industry sales in the United States were up 17.6 percent.

Sales for the Big Three alone rose 22.8 percent in August. Sales were up 13.1 percent in the last 10 days of the month and are up 15.8 percent for the year.

About 450 people turned up to apply for 10 jobs at Pay Less Drug Store's distribution warehouse in Wilsonville. Some applicants camped for several days outside of state employment offices in Beaverton and Oregon City (where the applications were being accepted). The openings were for on-call and weekend work only at the rate of \$9.75 per hour.

A Northeast Portland sewage disposal firm and two of its workers were fined \$14,500 by the state Department of Environmental Quality for illegally dumping sewage into the Columbia Slough on August 5. Documents made public Tuesday charged McInnis Enterprises, a company also doing business as Schulz Sanitation, with a "flagrant, intentional and inexcusable" violation of the law in an incident that left sewage sludge deposits up to 3 feet deep for a 500-foot length of the slough.

cause of construction accidents, often resulting in death by asphyxiation.

Also on the Banfield project, Hatch was cited for not storing gas cylinders in an upright position, for not having enough fire extinguishers, for operating heavy equipment without back-up alarms, for using dangerous scaffolding, and for not having a qualified first aid person at the worksite.

APD records dating from September, 1982 show that on other projects, Hatch was cited several times for laxity with regard to hard hats ("I don't wear 'em," he has

It is no secret that the present Administration has gone at the social service budget with a hatchet (while bloating military spending) in its attempts to reduce deficits. While it has failed to control the debt, the Administration has managed to cut spending for vital human resource programs. But the burden of those cuts has not been equally borne.

A new study by the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office bears this out; it provides the cold, hard numbers that outline the human costs. I would like to share some of the findings of this study with you.

The study, which looked at spending in 26 social service programs such as student loans, welfare, health services and job training, found that spending for these programs will decrease \$110 billion in fiscal years 1982-1985 because of changes adopted 1981-1983. Compare this to the fact that, during the same period, spending for defense will rise by \$90 billion.

The result of these cuts is that lower-income families are losing significant amounts of benefits -- much more than other income groups.

For a family with less than \$10,000 in annual income, the average reduction of benefits will be

\$470 per year; for those with more than \$10,000 income, the cuts will average \$280 per year.

And where have the cuts been? Student loans, which have been instrumental in opening the doors of higher education to those with lower incomes, were cut 27 per cent and compensatory education for disadvantaged children was cut 17 per cent. That from an Administration that has suddenly become a great "friend" of education.

Child nutrition programs were cut 28 per cent, while Food Stamps and Aid to Families with Dependent Children were both cut 13 per cent. Now the Administration finds it necessary to establish a task force to investigate why there is hunger in our country.

Employment and job training programs were cut 35 per cent, some \$25 billion. Yet, the country faces one of its greatest tasks in retraining workers for the changing economy.

The current Administration made great promises when coming into office. One would have hoped that an assessment of federal spending for social services after two years would be a measure of what we have gained. Instead, it is a measure of what we have lost. And the loss is great.

On Sept. 24, 1982, a Hatch worker suffered a broken shoulder, bruises and lacerations when she was run over by the air compressor upon which she was riding while working as a flagger on a project near Sweet Home. Hatch was cited for not providing adequate safety instruction and supervision.

Woodhull said that Hatch is up against "a host of problems" making for especially tough working conditions on the Banfield project: heavy traffic, a narrow right of way, and buildings abutting the freeway. "I don't think his rec-

According to Rocker, "there have been a number of small incidents that have been reported that wouldn't have been had there not been this controversy out on the freeway . . . there are a lot of people out there watching every move (Hatch) is making."
