

Mallory Avenue Christian gets new pastor

The community is invited to join Mallory Avenue Christian Church as they celebrate their common ministry in Christ at the installation of Rev. Douglas A. Wirt and Rev. Cathy Myers Wirt as co-pastors on Sunday, September 11, at 3:30 p.m.

The co-pastors began their ministry with Mallory Avenue Christian Church on August 1, and will be sharing equally in the full range of pastoral duties.

Participating in the celebration will be Multnomah County Commissioner Gladys McCoy, Rev.

John Garlington representing the Albina Ministerial Alliance, and Dr. Mark Reid, Regional Minister for the Christian Church, Disciples of Christ, in Oregon, as well as many other members and friends of the congregation.

Rev. Marge Green, Community Minister of the Ecumenical Parish of North and Northeast Portland, will bring the message, using the theme United Through Christ.

Cathy Myers Wirt is a graduate of Milwaukie High School, and attended Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon before going to

Macalester College in St. Paul, Minnesota, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree, graduating Phi Beta Kappa and Summa Cum Laude. Cathy Myers Wirt studied for the ministry at Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, California, graduating in June of this year with a Masters of Divinity Degree. She has had previous church experience in Campus Ministry at Macalester College, Chaplaincy training at Emanuel Hospital in Portland, with Lafayette Christian Church and First Christian Church, Palo Alto, both in California. Additional work experience includes staff responsibilities for the Center for Women and Religion in Berkeley, California and Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon in Portland.

Cathy Myers Wirt is currently serving in her second term as a member of the General Board of the Christian Church, Disciples of Christ, in the United States and Canada, a group which determines policy for the 1.2 million member denomination. As a member of this board, she also serves on the Administrative Committee and Nominations Committee.

Douglas Arthur Wirt graduated from John Adams High School in Portland, and graduated Cum Laude with Honors from Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota. Douglas Wirt studied for the ministry in Berkeley, California. While at Pacific School of Religion, Doug served as the only student member of the seminary's Board of Trustees. He graduated from the school with a Master of Divinity Degree.

Previous churches where Doug has worked include Campus Ministry at Carleton College, First Christian Church, Portland, University Christian Church, Berkeley, and First Christian Church, Palo Alto.

Mallory Avenue Christian Church has been a part of Northeast Portland for more than 80 years, and seeks to be an All Peoples' Church.

Mallory Avenue is actively involved in the community through its People Are Beautiful program for children and youth, and shares its building with the Northeast YWCA and the Multnomah County Mental Health Drop-in Center.

U.S.S.R. levies spy charge

With two back-up systems this error would be impossible. (Litton Industries, maker of the navigation equipment said failure of all three systems would be impossible).

- Why didn't Japan air control or the U.S. military warn the Korean pilot that he was over Soviet territory?

- When the Korean pilot reported an incorrect position to Japan ground control and they saw on radar that he was elsewhere, why didn't they tell him?

- Why didn't the U.S. use the "Hot Line" or other communication to contact the U.S.S.R. and tell them it was a civilian plane?

- Why did the Korean plane refuse to respond to attempts to communicate with it and why did it refuse to land?

- Why didn't the U.S. play the tape of the entire 2 1/2 hours that the plane was over Soviet territory to the U.N.?

- Why were the recordings of the Korean pilot not played?

- Why didn't the U.S. play the recording of Japan ground control's communications with the airliner for the U.N.?

The incident, instigated by the U.S., is now being used to launch "a malicious and hostile anti-Soviet campaign . . . to try and blacken the image of the Soviet Union, to provoke a feeling of hatred toward Soviet people, to present the aims of the foreign policy of the U.S.S.R. in a distorted perspective, and to distract attention from its peace initiatives.

"In a situation when tensions and anti-Soviet hysteria are being whipped up, U.S. leaders would like to evade the solution of major international problems on which the destinies of the peoples depend. And the moment for this provocation has been chosen purposefully. It has been staged precisely now at a time when the question is being solved whether the arms race will be stopped and the threat of nuclear war removed or this threat will keep growing. All indications are, including the mentioned (Sept. 5) speech of the American President, that the U.S. Administration intends to follow the road of intensifying confrontation with the Soviet Union. R. Reagan's credo, to quote him, is 'peace through strength'."

Fast for Life continues

On August 6, 13 men and women from six countries, including Charles Gray and Dorothy Granada from the United States, began fasting on water only until a significant step is taken to halt the nuclear arms race.

They believe the arms race must be stopped this year, before U.S. Pershing II and cruise missiles join Soviet SS-20s in Europe and force both sides into a "launch on warning" posture.

They have chosen to join the millions who hunger daily. 40,000 children under age five die needlessly of malnutrition every day. They could be fed, clothed, and housed for a year on what is spent in less than two weeks on the arms race.

They hope to inspire the millions of people in the world who oppose the arms race to take strong action now.

They have asked for people to send 10 letters to world leaders between September 6-9 supporting their call for significant action to

halt the nuclear arms race. They are pledged to fast until such a step is taken.
