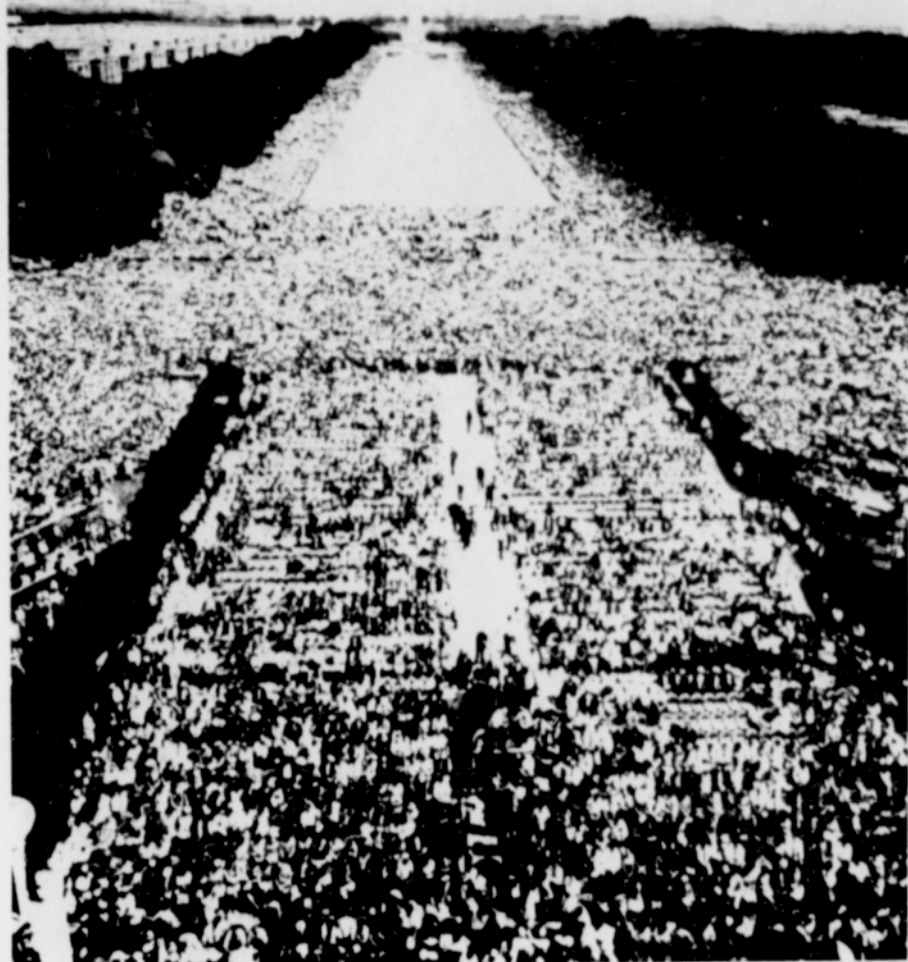


The dream is one of equality of opportunity.
