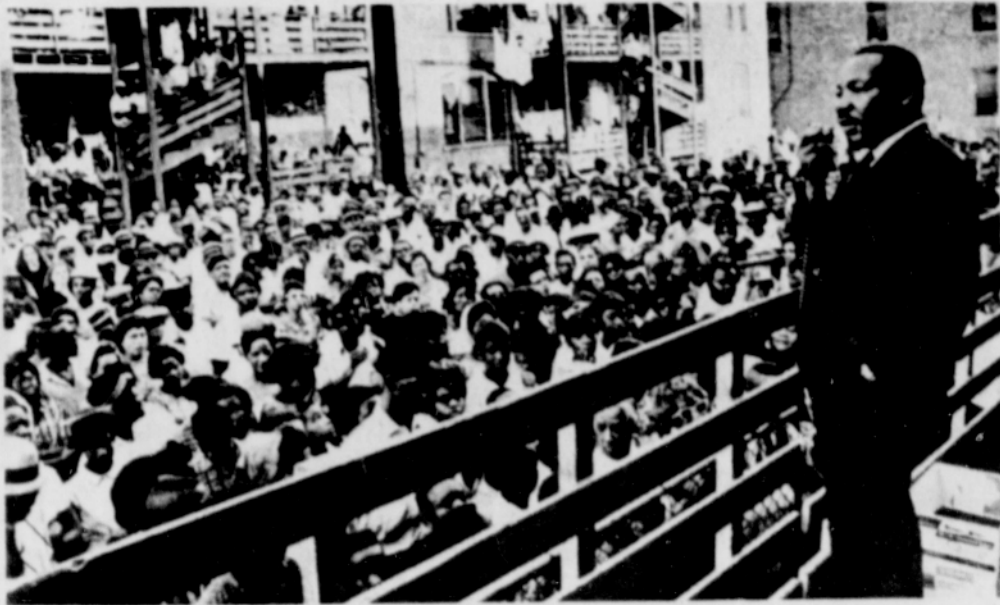


The foundation is love . . .

Martin Luther King, Jr.'s vision and struggle to achieve freedom and dignity for all people extends to today where poverty, racism and militarism are still rampant. He called for specific plans for action—realistic programs and suggestions for what should and could be done. At this time as we pay tribute to Dr. King and rededicate ourselves to vision and struggle, the following of his thoughts hold special meaning to me as a political candidate and as a Black American:

"... And so we shall have to do more than register and more than vote; we shall have to create leaders who embody virtues we can respect, who have moral and ethical principles we can applaud with an enthusiasm that enables us to rally support for them based on confidence and trust. We will have to give loyal support to those who merit it. We will have to be a reliable constituency for those who prove themselves to be committed warriors in our behalf. When our movement has partisan political personalities whose unity with their people is unshakable and whose independence is genuine, they will be treated in white political councils with the respect those who embody such power deserve."
