

Celebrate International Women's Day, March 10th

The Fifth Annual International Women's Day Festival will be held March 10th, at the Downtown YWCA. This festival celebrates the achievements of women around the world. Daylong events include music, dance, ethnic food, poetry, an art show, a film festival, ethnic arts and crafts demonstrations, and free child care. Also in honor of the day, free swims, saunas, and steams are offered to women. Admission to the festival is only \$1.

Some of the dancers who will be performing are Ruby Burns, African dance; Maria Moreno, Spanish and Argentine dancing; and Betty Garner, Ballet. Stumptown Cloggers, Native American Drummers and Dancers, Do Jump Theatre dancers, and Ayallah, an Israeli dance group, will also be performing. Over 55 group and solo performances will be held on four stages and will include Janice Scoggins, Rhythm and Blues; Joann Collins, Gospel; Tracey Clay, Rhythm and Blues; Rose Ann Butler, Gospel; and Artie Grissom, Rhythm and Blues.

The Art Show will include works by Sherrian Hagggar-Warren, ceramics; Lillian Pitt, Native American Masks and Raku; Carol Probasco, Photography; Janice

Ingersall Williamson, Metalsculpture; and Glenda Payne, Oil Pastels. Portland area Poets will also be reading their works throughout the day.

The YWCA is located at 1111 S.W. Tenth Ave., Portland, Oregon. Free child care will be provided at St. James Child Care Center located at 1315 S.W. Park, 2 blocks from the Downtown YWCA. Parents need to provide the child's lunch.
