

Local businessman visits Cascade campus

Al Allison, owner of Piedmont Hardware on Killingsworth, discovered another world last week. He's operated the old-fashioned hardware store across the street from Portland Community College Cascade Campus for 32 years and never walked across the street.

Campus Dean Jim Van Dyke and Science and Industry Department Chair Maury Merrick decided Allison ought to see where some of his nuts and bolts have been used

over the past years. They invited him over for lunch in the cafeteria and a tour.

"He's a good neighbor," Merrick explained. "We want to be a good neighbor in exchange."

Allison is a neighborhood institution. At one point he sold the store and when he bought it back a year ago, the neighbors threw a big party for him, Merrick explained.

Not only does he carry almost anything you'd need, but Merrick said he's known as the neighborhood "fixit man".

Allison was amazed at what he found across the street. "First of all, the food was good. I usually just come to work and go out for a quick lunch. I didn't know I could eat at the college. Now that I know, I'll go back," he said.

When he took a tour of the school, Allison was surprised to find all the vocational programs. "I didn't know they did all those things

with Tektronix; even making eyeglasses," he said.

What did he think was there? "Well, you know, classes where people learn English and all that stuff" he replied. And, of course he was told that existed as well.

When asked what he thought about a new building on the block and more focus on small business, Allison just beamed. "It should help everyone," he said.

Committees will also act on issues including health care, sheriff patrols, parks, jail policy, youth services, etc.

Delegates to the Congress will be selected by legislative district—30 from each of the 13 districts in Multnomah County—at meetings to be held during the week of March 12th.

The Congress meetings will be held on Saturdays, April 28th and May 19th, at Cleveland High School from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
