ICHAEL BENJAMIN, direc-Ltor of the N/NE Community Mental Health Center, announces the opening of the two-day 1984 Ethnic Minority Conference II on Thursday, June 14th at the Thunderbird Motor Inn at Jantzen Beach. The conference is beamed to attract service providers, managers, directors and policy makers of a variety of public agencies.

The N/NE Center is a comprehensive mental health agency providing preventive, maintenance and rehabilitative mental health care to persons living in this area of Multnomah County. The goal of the conference, according to Franklin Jenkins, conference coordinator, is to provide opportunities for participants to gain knowledge and awareness as they increase their skills in working effectively with people of color.

The planning committee includes some staff and board members of the host agency. Also serving on this committee are representatives of a score of other city, county and state agencies that offer services to the diverse cultural groups of this community, regardless of their ability to

Keynote address for the general conference session is to be by Byron Kunisawa, one of the nations leading consultants on minority issues. Kunisawa was the keynoter for the 1982 Ethnic Minority Conference. Opening keynote speaker will be James Comer, M.D., professor of Child Psychiatry at the Yale Child Study Center of Yale University. Dr. Comer will discuss: "How mental health providers can work effectively with ethnic minorities." In workshops beginning later in the morning, Dr. Comer will lead sessions on "Working with Minority Children in School."

Other workshops will deal with a variety of subjects such as alcoholism, Alzheimers disease, minority males, language as a crosscultural barrier in counseling, the improvement of services to troubled youth, special issue of refugees and the pitfalls of grant writing. Workshop leaders invited from around the nation come from: New Orleans, Seattle, Los Angeles, Washington, D.C., and Rockville, Maryland.

ICHAEL RICE, a Northeast Portland member of the Portland Rose Society, is one of the 36 people contributing services as a rose garden judge for the society. Rice also grows prize roses in his own garden on N.E. San Rafael street

Rice has boxes and boxes of award ribbons won in rose judging exhibits not only in Portland, but in rose shows around the state, in Seattle, Yakima, Missoula, Montana, several places in California and as far away as Memphis, Tennessee. His Portland garden has many varieties of roses-tea roses, floribundas and miniatures. All colors including lavendar are welcome in his well kept rows. He has 120 bushes and-no aphids-the bane of rose growers. Foliage is glossy and healthy in the Rice garden where Rice can name any plant by its leaves.

Rice gives tender care year 'round to his bushes but gives special care at judging time, for other judges will inspect his garden while Rice is away judging other rose gardens in other parts of Portland. He has no fear—only confidence as he tucks away another award for perfection.
