Sealed bids for the Columbia River, Multnomah Channel, Virginia Lake Boat Tie-Up will be received by the Purchasing Manager of the Port of Portland, 700 N.E. Multnomah Street, Portland, Oregon, (mailing address: Post Office Box 3529, Portland, Oregon, 97208) until 4:00 p.m., July 24, 1984, and thereafter publicly opened and read.

MINORITY BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (MBE) INCENTIVE PROGRAM:
A 2 PERCENT BIDDING ADVANTAGE WILL BE GIVEN TO BIDDERS WHO:

- HAVE BEEN CERTIFIED BY THE PORT OF PORTLAND AS MBE's, OR
- EMPLOY SUBCONTRACTORS THAT HAVE BEEN CERTIFIED BY THE PORT OF PORTLAND AS MBE's AND ARRANGE FOR THEM TO PERFORM WORK THAT REPRESENTS NOT LESS THAN 10 PERCENT OF THE TOTAL DOLLAR AMOUNT BID.

Scope:

Removing two existing dolphins, designated trees and miscellaneous debris; and furnishing and installing a floating dock and walk. Location is in the Multnomah Channel side of Sauvie Island at approximate River Mile 17.5.

Bids must be on the bid form which will be provided to prospective bidders and must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check drawn on a United States bank or a bid bond payable to The Port of Portland in an amount equal to at least 120 percent of the total amount bid.

Bidders are required to prequalify. Prequalification statements must be received at least 5 days prior to the time set for bid opening. Applications for prequalification may be submitted less than 5 days before bid opening, but consideration by Port cannot be assured.

Attention is called to the provisions of the Oregon Revised Statutes 279.350, providing that workers be paid prevailing wage rates.

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were represented at the march and service in a show of unity and strength. Members of the Teamsters, the Western Pulp and Paper Workers, Continental Airline Pilots, and the Portland Policement's Union were all present.

Retired dockworker August Yan-kauskas, 76, was a member of the Oregon National Guard at the time of the strike and disobeyed his sergeant when he was ordered to report for duty. "I'm not going to go out and shoot my brother," he

reportedly told the sergeant.

Veronica Foster, a member of the ILWU auxilliary, called the 1934 strike, "A culmination of everybody's hopes," and added, "if you didn't live through those days, you don't know what unionism is." Foster said unionism represents much more than the popular image of gouging the boss for more money. "It's a give and take for decent working conditions and for the productivity the boss wants." Without the union, she added, there's no give by the employers, only take.

Jackson demands

wait until 1988, when the Democratic party has it well within its power to right some of the inequalities at the convention?"

Jackson's vision

In Chicago, Hill said, Jackson said there were ten key issues Black people should pay attention to:

- Fairness. "There are 2 million new voters unrepresented because of delegate selection, double primaries and the threshold rule."
- Voting Rights Act.
- Affirmative Action. "We need a time table to measure growth."
- Job Development.
- Peace. "Jackson went to Harvard University to discuss peace issues with the other two candidates. After they had gotten through with two-thirds of the debate, they had left out three-fourths of the world."
- Justice (Equal protection under the law).
- Leadership. "Be leaders as well as try to mold the opinion of other leaders."
- Unity.
- Voter registration.
- Beyond November. "Black people should continue to run for political office at all levels."

Hill stated that the local Jackson campaign registered four thousand new voters. "That is historical. Also, people from all walks of life—who never worked together before—came together on short notice to run a good campaign locally, as well as nationally.

Farrakhan links

In responding to the observation that Farrakhan has diminished Jackson's influence within the Democratic party, Herndon called the Farrakhan episode "hypocritical" and said it, "was being viewed with a double standard."

"Jackson has said time after time again that he strongly disagrees with what Mr. Farrakhan has said. When Reagan got rid of James Watt, no one asked him to repudiate Watt nor did anyone demand President Ford repudiate Earl Butts when he kicked him out."

Also, Herndon forced a reporter's question to be more reflective of the facts in appraising Farrakhan's role in Jackson's campaign. "In the beginning, Jackson used the Fruits of Islam as body guards, but the secret service took over when they declared him an official candidate.

"As of four months ago, 8 people had been arrested at Jackson rallies. He would have been a fool not to have some kind of protection."

Herndon stated there was no comparison between the Nation of Islam and the Ku Klux Klan. "The Nation of Islam never murdered, lynched, blew up schools or overturned buses. Here you have an organization who went around trying to develop the Rainbow Coalition. Now just because Farrakhan messed up, does not mean the organization has gone back to 1964."

Columbia Indians

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flooded by the Columbia River dams. The government gave the Indians these five sites "in lieu" of those that were flooded. To this day, the government has not made good on its promise to build new homes and villages for the Indians.

The remaining sites are essential to the Indians for access to the river and the salmon. The sites symbolize the last of a way of life, and the Indians mean to hold on to them at all cost.

This is Indian land," said Sohapp, scanning the rocky shore and the choppy waters he knows so well. "What little land we have left, we want to keep."

Now the government, the federal Bureau of Indian Affairs to be exact, wants to evict Sohapp, his family and relatives and the rest of the Indians living at the in lieu sites. The BIA says the sites were intended

as temporary campsites for Indian use during the fishing season. In April, the Indians were given 30 days to leave, but months later, they remain, and Sohapp says they aren't about to move and give the government control of Indian land.

"They said I could live here temporarily," said Sohapp, who has lived at Cook's landing for 20 years. "I said I am only on this earth temporarily."

To add insult to injury, the government also wants the Indians to register their river fishing sites, "so they know where the nets are," said Sohapp.

The bulldozers might come, but the Indians are staying, and a local support group has pledged to help. "We are willing to be here to put our bodies in the way if anything happens," a spokeswoman for the group told Sohapp recently.
