A native of Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Jean was an army "brat", and traveled extensively, with her family, all over the world (Germany, Japan, Korea, Italy, etc). Settling in Portland after her father's retirement, she graduated from David Douglas High School and later received her Bachelor of Science degree in nursing from the University of Portland.

A true community-oriented person, Mrs. Lynch has volunteered numerous times for various social-service agencies and in many capacities. However, she is known for her work with sickle-cell anemia fund raising events and clinics, development of hypertension clinics at Sabin Community-Center, with the Red Cross and with immunization clinics.

When asked for her secret to professional and personal success, she said, "I have endurance and I like to know why and how things occur...how/if I can utilize these things in my life to my best advantage."
