Christian economics topic

Economic issues from a Christian perspective will be the focus of the Staley Distinguished Christian Scholar Lecture series at Warner Pacific College from April 30 to May 2, 1985. Dr. Robert Weaver, Associate Professor of Business at Bethel College, St. Paul, Minnesota, will address these issues in three public lectures: "The Bible and Economic Justice" — Tuesday, April 30, 10 a.m., in McGuire Auditorium. "Neighborhood Economic Development as a Christian Response to Poverty" — Wednesday, May 1, 7:30 p.m. in Egtvedt Lounge. "Poverty and Loss of Personhood" — Thursday, May 2, 10 a.m. in McGuire Auditorium. After each lecture, forum sessions are scheduled to allow members of the

audience to ask questions of and interact with Dr. Weaver. Dr. Weaver received his Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota in Educational Policy and Administration and his M.B.A. from California State University in Fresno. He is Director of the Small Business Institute of Bethel College, has worked with neighborhood economic development groups in rural and urban Mississippi, and serves as a consultant to small businesses and churches on mission clarification. Sanctuary Coalition gala

Proceeds from the event will go to support the continuing work of the Portland Sanctuary Coalition, refugee needs in Central America, and the national legal defense fund of the sanctuary movement.

Laura A. Evans services Tuesday

Funeral services will be held 2 p.m. Tuesday in Caldwell's Colonial Mortuary for Laura A. Evans, a self-employed caterer and domestic worker, who died recently in a local hospital. She was 76.

Mrs. Evans was born in Wichita, Kansas, to Betta Grove and Jake Horton, moving to Portland in 1943. Her husband, A. D. Evans, preceded her in death.

She was a member of A.M.E. Zion Church for 25 years and served on the board of stewards and the missionary society.

She is survived by two sons, Phillip Bryant of Portland, and Melvin Smith of San Diego, 10 grandchildren, five great-grandchildren and nine great-great-grandchildren. A daughter, Betty Haskins, preceded her in death.

AMA hosts sixth anniversary banquet

The first Black woman in history to be elected to the Oregon Legislative Assembly, the Honorable Margaret L. Carter, State Representative District 18, will be the guest speaker for the Albina Ministerial Alliance and the program's 6th Annual Anniversary Banquet. The event takes place Saturday, May 4, 1985, 6:00 p.m. at the Cosmopolitan Airtel, 6221 N.E. 82nd Avenue, Portland. Representative Carter, mother of 9, is a long-time supporter of childcare and will address the subject of "Preserving Tomorrow's Greatest Resource"... our children. Mrs. Carter holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree, Portland State University; Master's Degree in Education, Oregon State University and post graduate studies, Washington State University. Her career includes: teacher, Albina Youth Opportunity School, 1971-73; Counselor, Portland Community College, 1973-present,

and Business Woman, 1975-present. She continues to be actively involved in the following community activities: Oregon Alliance for Black School Educators, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Joyful Sound (music director), Piedmont Church of Christ. Representative Carter was elected to the Legislative Assembly with over 80% of the vote in her district in November, 1984. In her first run for an elected office, she received the largest vote majority of any candidate in the state. Joint Trade and Economic Development, Education, and Human Resources are the committees on which she currently serves. The Alliance and its programs commends Rep. Carter in her achievements and look forward to hearing her speak. The Albina Ministerial Alliance (AMA) is an ecumenical ministers organization involving 40-plus ministers serving congregations in North and

Northeast Portland. The organization is approximately 55 years old but has been actively involved in community service programs since 1964 and was incorporated for non-profit in 1971. Its leadership is spearheaded by predominately Black ministers. A primary purpose of the organization is to identify and support programs through which the ministry can provide social and economic enrichment to those who live and work in the community, and to seek and disburse funds for the benefit of families residing in the service area. AMA Family Day and Night Care, AMA Self-Enhancement Program, Head Start, and Emergency Food are all positive results of the commitment. Donation for the event is \$15 per person. Maranatha Church honors Wendell Wallace

Maranatha Church is honoring one of its earlier pastor by naming its newly completed banquet and gym area the "Wendell Wallace Multi-purpose room." At the same time the church's new conference room will be dedicated in memory of the late Paul Knaupp whose presence in the church for many years was distinguished by a spirit of love and reconciliation. The church invites the community to the dedication of these versatile facilities at the Sunday morning service on May 5th, when the Rev. Wendell Wallace himself will be present and ministering. He will be speaking also during the evening services of Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday, May 5, 6 and 7. The new multi-purpose room was formerly the church's sanctuary, but is now remodeled to accommo-

date either a reception or a ball game, a banquet or a youth festival. In the future it will be equipped with basketball goals, and the new carpet is already inlaid with basketball court markings. It is a feature of the new building that illustrates the church's purpose in "Building to Serve." The Rev. Wendell Wallace was pastor of Maranatha from 1961 to 1972. During his ministry, the church moved from Beech and Borthwick to its present location at N.E. 12th and Skidmore Street. It has experienced two major expansions of its building. Wallace's ministry was marked by dynamic preaching, prophecy and healings. During the Civil Rights Movement he attacked both white and Black racism, and welcomed people of all races and economic backgrounds to the church. He min-

istered to youth in the hippie and drug cultures. During the days of marching for civil and human rights he also led a march up Williams Avenue proclaiming that "Jesus is lord!" There were times when the crowds were so great that the services had to be moved to the Civic Auditorium or to the Jefferson High School auditorium. He left a spiritual legacy that the present congregation proposes to remember by naming the enlarged, unique room in his honor. The church foresees a wide range of uses for the Wendell Wallace Multi-purpose Room, for youth events, fellowship, community service, and worship. The dual dedication on Sunday, and the special meetings to follow through Tuesday evening, are open to the public. All are invited.
