Lisa Bullock wins NBA Hotshot category

Lisa Bullock of Indianapolis, Indiana, recently won the National Championship of the Pepsi/NBA Hotshot finals held in Kansas City, Missouri. She is the first Black female Hotshot National Champion in the 16-18 age category since the inception of the program in

The Pepsi-NBA Hotshot program is a year-round basketball skills competition in which contestants are given three, one-minute rounds to accumulate as many points as possible by sinking baskets from five designated areas on the court called "Hotspots." Each "Hotspot" is worth a different point value.

The program, which is the longest runing and largest youth skills program in the country, has just completed its ninth year. Young people from over 1,800 youth service organizations participated in Hotshot's six categories of competition. The categories are: Girls 9-12, 13-15, 16-18 and Boys 9-12, 13-15, 16-18. Bullock took high honors in the girls, 16-18 group. She advanced to the National Chamkpionships by winning competitions at Hill Playground, Hill Center, the Indianapolis playoffs and the Indiana Finals.

Representing the Indiana Pacers, Bullock who has been a participant in the

Hotshot program since she was 13, "out shot" contestants from 22 other NBA cities to become the National Champion. In recognition of her accomplishments, Lisa's name will be enshrined in the Basketball Hall of Fame along with the names of other Pepsi/NBA Hotshot National Champions. She was also honored by the Pacers during halftime of their April 8 match against the Chicago Bulls. Bullock is 18-years-old and is a senior at Arsenal Technical High School in Indianapolis. She will attend

Indiana University at Bloomington in the Fall of '85.

Lisa had the following to say about her Hotshot experience: "I practiced every day to reach the National Championships, but it was worth it because I got the chance to make new friends as I advanced from competition to competition. I met kids from New York, Chicago, and Kansas City and I liked that. I would encourage more kids to get into the program so that they could have the same opportunity."



Maurice Lucas did involve himself with our community. He ran clinics, played tennis and communicated with the people of the community. Michael Harper donated his time at the NYSP Camp at Concordia. He could have received pay elsewhere. Herm Gilliam added his contributions. He was very visible. Are these a different breed of men? Come on fellows, help our community! Our kids look up to you. If you don't know who to contact, call Roy Jernigan at the Observer; John Phillips at the Skanner; Tony Hopson at Jefferson High School or me at Beaumont Middle School. This is a cry for help. Do something for the kids who can't afford \$200 to go to camp. Please put back some of the things that you have taken out of some other community.

Blazers, spend some time telling our young people the importance of education, the importance of working hard and being dedicated. Tell them if they work hard that they can be successful in life, not just athletics. Our kids need to have a strong self-image. They need hope. They need your help, Brother Blazers. Believe me, there are a lot of us who do it all the time absolutely free. But I can live with my conscience - can you?


