Summer vacation becomes a lesson in learning

"My political activism in Portland is centered around anti-apartheid, said Paquita Garatea, who recently returned from a visit to Euskadi;

Euskadi-or the Basque Provinces, as it is commonly called-consists of seven provinces: four in Northern Spain and three in Southern France. The provinces sit in the Pyreneese mountains bordering France and Spain and stretching from the Bay of Biscay to the Gulf of Lyons.

Garatea's grandparents from both sides of the family tree migrated to this country between 1915 and 1920. They settled in the Boise, Idaho area and later some family members moved to Eastern Oregon.

Garatea had never been to the "Basque country" and this summer while taking a break from Portland State University (PSU), she went there to visit relatives and friends.

In some respects, the people of Euskadi are like Blacks in South Africa: they are fighting for their independence. Garatea said, "It was and still is taxation without representation." Garatea said the suppression of human rights in Euskadi became especially oppressive during the reign of Gernal Francisco Franco who ruled Spain for over 40 years.

When Garatea stepped off the plane in the "Basque country," she said she was greeted by "Guardian civil"-soldiers-wielding machine

The history of the "Basque people is oral," Garatea said, a history has been lost."

Yet some things remain the same. "The language, which Franco tried to destroy," Garatea said, "remains the most distinct language which is not Indo-European." Garatea added that the language has not been linked to any other language in the world.

"I stayed in a fishing village of 15,000 people. It was called Ondarroa and the village supplied all of Spain with fish," she said. "I stayed with my maternal grandmother."

But even in a place where one would expect serenity to be blue skies and swells of water from which fishing nets were hauled, violence struck.

Garatea spent 21 days in "The Basque country" and went to seven demonstrations. One demonstration, which drew 13,000 protesters, was in response to the government's cutting social security and beefing up the military. The other demonstration,

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which lasted seven days, was in response to the police abducting three men in the middle of the night.

"We demonstrated every day until they were set free," she said. The men, one of whom was a cousin of Garatea's, were tortured for seven days about a government outlawed group called ETA.

There are two factions to ETA, Euskadi Ta Aramatasuma-which means Basque and arms-and Euskadi Ta Askatazuna-which means Basque and freedom, she said. The former is the more militant of

"Without pressure from the militant faction of ETA there would be no cultural freedom now," she said, adding, "now there are grade schools that teach the Basque language, more cooperatives and businesses and you can fly the Ikurina -the Basque flag.'

Garatea believes the situation in the Basque provinces is more like Ireland's situation. And similar to the IRA, she said, "ETA is not going to give up until the seven provinces are free." She added that ETA has a motto which says, "Zazpiak-Bat. It means the seven are one.

Garatea is a history major at PSU and she intends to do a portion of her graduate work in the "Basque country." A single parent with an eight-year-old son, Jonas, she has been active with PSU's Students Against Apartheid, Portlanders Organized for Southern African Freedom and was student body president at Lane Community College in Eugene during academic year 1982-83. Garatea was also research assistant for PSU's African Art exhibit

While living in Eugene, Garatea was active with the Eugene Council for Human Rights in Latin America. Before moving to Eugene, she was a member of Oinkari Basque Dancers of Boise, Idaho for ten years.

"The struggle is for all people. The struggle continues and will continue and we must unite," she said.

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
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
