Japanese civilization talk at Portland State

Less than a year ago, a high Reagan Administration official said the U.S. would not help Ethiopia because it has a Marxist government.

But now, according to a lawyer for the U.S. Agency for International Development (AID), it seems that the previous policy has been scrapped and help from the U.S. is turning the tide in Ethiopia and other African countries.

AID is the agency that paves the way for U.S. policy with food and economic aid to Third World countries. It has often been linked in the press with the CIA and counter-insurgency efforts.

According to Richard Derham, a Harvard-educated lawyer and Seattle native, over \$150 million in private, non-profit aid has been sent to the drought areas; the Live Aid concert raised \$75 million, not to mention the aid sent by the U.S. government.

"There is food; it is getting into the country," he said. The logistical problem of getting the food to outlying areas continues, however. Few ports and bad roads make it a difficult task, Derham said.

"The good news is that the rain has returned. Ethiopia expects near-normal

rainfall," as do other drought-stricken countries, said Derham. At least one country, Zimbabwe, expects an export surplus of agricultural products this year, and refugees in Ethiopia and Somalia are beginning to return to their land, he said.

Africa had been doing fairly well prior to the drought, according to Derham. Most African countries only escaped the bondage of colonialism in the last 25 years, and they improved at a rapid pace. The literacy rate has improved dramatically in most countries, he said, while the infant mortality rate has decreased continent-wide by over 60 percent. "A child born in Kenya today has a significantly better chance of survival than my parents did," said Derham.

It is in agriculture where Africa's problems lie, problems which Derham blamed on mismanagement by Marxist governments. While world-wide per capita food production increased by 10 percent during the 60s and 70s, by 1980 it was down 15 percent in Ethiopia, 12 percent in Mali, 15 percent in Kenya, and a whopping 35 percent in Somalia. The situation deteriorated since then. "It is the decline in agriculture which left Africa vulner-

able to the drought," he said.

According to Derham, the African countries with free market economies have been most successful. He described a "Reagan Africa Initiative" encouraging free market experiments combined with the hybrid high yield grains and technology of the "green revolution." Implemented by AID, the program also includes scholarships for African students to study in the U.S. Such a program worked in India, he said, and it is working in Somalia. According to Derham, starving Ethiopians now call American wheat "Reagan," indicating their friendly attitude toward the U.S. administration.

What the U.S. gets in return, he said, is an improved strategic position over the Soviet Union. "It is in our strategic interest to remind these countries they are our friends," said Derham. AID programs also help establish a disciplined workforce, and open the way for American business and free trade, he said. "By the year 2000," said Derham, echoing the president's optimism about free enterprise, "a number of African countries will become beacons of progress as to what the right policies can do."
