Now everyone can re-live the great historic moments by Afro-American men and women athletes with the Afro-American Sports History Calendar. This beautifully illustrated full-color 1986 calendar is an exciting and educational reference for sports trivia fans and history buffs. It contains facts documenting the major achievements of Afro-American athletes in base-ball, basketball, boxing, football, track and field, tennis and more in both college and professional sports.

Each month is introduced with a montage of photographs and illustrations that captures some of the achievements in the careers of great Afro-American athletes. The calendar of legendary Afro-American sports heroes was guided and supervised by Arthur Ashe, internationally renowned tennis champion and sports commentator. On July 13, 1985, Ashe was the first Black man ever to be inducted into the 31-year-old International Tennis Hall of Fame. Ashe is completing his book, A Hard Road to Glory: A History of the Afro-American Athlete, to be published next year by Howard University Press under the direction of Charles Harris. Ashe's research for this volume inspired the creation of the calendar.

"The contributions of Afro-American athletes have still not been fully documented in the history of sports in America," said Ashe. "I hope this calendar will remind all of us every day about the significant role they have played as champions and the pride we felt for their struggles and achievements."




