

Women's Aglow Fellowship schedules conference

A number of local women are planning to attend the 1985 International Conference of Women's Aglow Fellowship scheduled Nov. 3-6 in Anaheim, California.

They will join from six to eight thousand delegates from Women's Aglow Fellowships in the U.S. and around the world for the four-day meeting of Christian women at the Anaheim Convention Center.

Evangelism will be the conference theme. Highlights will be prayer for revival in all nations and unity among Christians, reports of God's moving throughout the world, plus praise, worship, prayer for healing and fellow-

Guest speakers will include Pat Robertson, founder and president of the Christian Broadcasting Network and host of TV's The 700 Club; David Wilkerson, the "gang preacher," whose Teen Challenge drug rehabilitation program is internationallyknown, and John Wimber, an outstanding figure in the field of church growth, who is also known widely for his teaching on signs and wonders, healing, and the ministry of the Holy Spirit and His gifts.

There will be about 20 women from the Portland P.M. Aglow Fellowship attending the conference. The Portland P.M. Aglow Fellowship meets every 4th Monday evening at 6:30 p.m. at The Salvation Army on Moore Street. Fellowship president is Melvia

Also speaking at the conference will be Aglow International President, Jane Hansen, and Aglow U.S. Field Representative, Matilda Kipfer. The international singing group, "Lightwave," and their speaker, Marty Berry, will also minister to conference delegates.

More than 700 lives have been taken as a result of apartheid in South

It is time for God's people to do what they do best in times like these and

A "National Day of Prayer for Peace" was called by Bishop Desmond M. Tutu and clergymen from various denominations recently.

"Tutu, winner of the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize, and other worshippers were forced to leave a prayer service at St. Mary's Anglican Cathedral in Johannesburg after two anonymous telephone callers warned that a bomb had been planted in the church. As the worshippers continued their service in a nearby building, the police, using dogs, searched the cathedral but found no explosives.

Tutu, who had initially suggested a weeklong work stoppage if the government failed to take steps to dismantle apartheid, later returned to the cathedral.

"Leaders of nearly 50 churches, including Black, English-speaking white and Afrikaner clergymen, announced last month that they would urge Christians to stay home Wednesday to give the day to repentance, mourning and prayer for those sinful aspects of our national life which have led us to the present crisis.'

"The churchmen said they were seeking the release of political detainees, an end to apartheid and the state of emergency proclaimed by the government, and negotiations between the government and Black leaders they regard as authentic. They later stressed that they were not calling for a one-day strike but were asking Christians to request the day off. The churchmen suggested that those who could not take the day off ask for time to attend prayer services.

"The action by the religious leaders quickly drew controversy and some Black organizations and labor unions criticized the churchmen for not consulting them before making the call. The United Democratic Front, the main nonparliamentary opposition group in the nation, said it supported the move in principle but would not urge people to stay away from work.

"As South Africans prayed for peace, the police reported the deaths of two Black men in violence that has continued in this nation for more than a year.' Reported by Sheila Rule of The N.Y. Times

Burnside area Loaves & Fishes celebrates renovation

The public is invited to attend a reception celebrating the renovation of Burnside Loaves & Fishes Center. Bill Naito, Burnside area developer, will be on hand to help launch the new facility. The open house is slated for Wednesday, Oct. 23 from 4 to 6 p.m. Burnside Loaves & Fishes is located at 601 West Burnside, Second Floor.

Last year, Burnside Loaves & Fishes served over 25,000 meals to indigent and homeless senior citizens who congregate in the Burnside/Old town neighborhood. In addition 13,900 Meals-on-Wheels (Meals-on-Heels) were served to the shut-in elderly who reside in the area's apartments and hotels. Loaves & Fishes has operated a meal site in the Burnside area since 1975. Two hundred twenty meals are served each day; 40 percent of those are to homebound elderly who very often have no cooking facilities.

The \$85,000 renovation project included the building and equiping of a kitchen and meal service area. In addition, a storage area was added and the making level. dining room was spruced up.

Funds for the project came from the Chiles Foundation; Multnomah Area Agency on Aging; The Collins Foundation; The Clark Foundation, and Oregon Community Foundation. Also, many individuals, including a Loaves & Fishes staff member, donated to the renovation's capital fund.

Loaves & Fishes Centers, Inc. is a private, not-for-profit, tax-exempt corporation which provides hot, nutritious noon meals and variety of supportive services to people age 60 and over. Loaves & Fishes has 30 centers serving over 3,200 meals daily in Clackamas, Multnomah and Washing-

Participants gather at centers where they take their noon meal and enjoy friendship and activities. Homebound elderly receive Meals-on-Wheels - hot meals delivered to them at home by Loaves & Fishes volunteers.

Volunteers give approximately 24,000 hours each month in all areas of the program and at every decision
