

## NFL update

The Seattle Seahawks finally looked like Super Bowl contenders after whipping the L.A. Raiders 33-3 at the King Dome last Sunday.

Seahawks' corner back Terry Taylor returned an interception of 75 yards for a touchdown.

Dave Krieg threw two touchdown passes, which made the 27th consecutive game he has thrown at least one touchdown pass. This is the second best in NFL history.

The Chicago Bears remain the only undefeated team in the NFL with a 16-10 victory over the Green Bay Packers. The Bears improved their season record to 9-0. In that game, William "the refrigerator" Perry, the Bears' number-one draft pick, caught a four-yard pass from Jim McMahon. Perry is a 308-pound defensive lineman, who Bears coach Mike Ditka sometimes uses on offense. The touchdown pass was Perry's second of the season, his other score came on a one-yard run against the Packers.

In other NFL news, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers kept the losing streak intact with a 22-20 loss to the New York Giants. The Buccaneers are now 0-9 for the season.

Portland gets another professional football team this coming year. The Denver Golds of the USFL will move to Portland in the fall of 1986. The Golds' owner received permission from the league to move the team from Denver to Portland. Former Portland State Vikings coach Darrel "Mouse" Davis is the Golds' head coach.

This announcement means the official end of the Portland Breakers.

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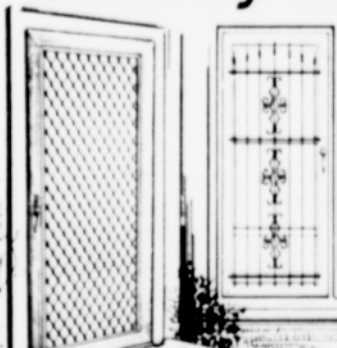

## Globetrotters in Portland with first female in lineup Nov. 17

The Harlem Globetrotters will add a new twist to their game when they return to Portland Sunday, Nov. 17. For the first time in the Globetrotters' 60-year history there will be a female in the lineup.

The newest Globetrotter is Lynette Woodard, who captained the Gold-Medal-winning 1984 women's U.S. Olympic basketball team. A four-time All-American at the University of Kansas, she earned the nickname the "Leaping Lizard" as she set an all-time major collegiate scoring record of 3,649 points.

Lynette Woodard, the first female Globetrotter in their world-renowned team's history is no stranger to honors and superlatives. The captain of the 1984 Women's Olympic Basketball Team was accumulating awards long before her team took the Gold at the Los Angeles Summer Olympic games in 1984.

While a freshman at the University of Kansas, she led the nation in rebounds, averaging nearly 15 per game, and during the next three years was the national leader in steals. In her sophomore year, she led the nation in scoring, averaging 31.9 points scoring 1,177 points in a single

season. To close out her college career in 1981, Lynette was and is still the most prolific scorer in Division I Women's College Basketball history with an amazing 3,649 points; surpassing former greats JoJo White and Wilt Chamberlain's scoring records. A triple-crown winner, Woodard was the first woman selected for the 1982 NCAA Top Five Award, won the coveted Wade Award, presented to the finest woman's basketball player in the country in 1981, and was the recipient of the Broderick award in 1982. She made the Kodak All-American Team four times (1978-1981), and was named to the select Academic All-American Team in 1980 and 1981 by the College Sports Information Directors Association. Adding yet another laurel to her crown, she captained the all-winning side and played a major role in the United States' victory at the Pan Am games in 1983. Her uniform, 31, was the first to be retired by the University of Kansas.

At 6 foot, the 26-year-old Wichita, Kansas native is agile and has a jumping ability that has earned her the nickname of "Leaping Lizard." Her former coach at the University of Kansas, Marian Washington has characterized Lynette as "the only player in the country who can do so many different things so well on the court. She has played guard, post and forward and does the things that contribute to winning. Somebody may shoot a little better, somebody may rebound better because of their size, but nobody can do all those things and more, as well as she can. Lynette is a complete player, playing both ends of the court."

After playing a year in Italy leading her league in scoring, Lynette returned to join the coaching staff of the University of Kansas where she is still a legend. Woodard believes in teamwork; and individual honors, though generously garnered, have never been as important to her as the team's winning record.

Woodard is also dedicated to community work. She was named Woman of the Year by the Wichita Branch of the NAACP after she helped start a Big Brother-Big Sister program and is active in work with the American Cancer Society and Special Olympics.

As the new member and Little Sister of the Globetrotters, she will be nurturing her talents under their personal and team tutelage to help her bring her basketball skills to their highest potential. "The team is thrilled to have the opportunity to pass their knowledge and experience on to such a willing, able and superior student of the sport," says President Earl Durva.

When the tipoff comes at 1:30 in the afternoon, the 26-year-old, six-footer promises to be a major addition to the Globetrotters' brand of family fun at the Memorial Coliseum.

### Ducks reach .500

The Oregon Ducks defeated San Jose State 35-13 in Autzen Stadium. The victory evened the Ducks' record to 4-4 for the season. Tony Cherry, the Ducks' leading rusher, didn't play due to a pulled groin muscle.

Low Barnes caught seven passes for 130 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown from Chris Miller.

### Bynum gets record

Reggie Bynum became the all-time leading receiver in Oregon State's history in the Beavers' 26-6 Pacific 10 conference loss to the Arizona Wildcats.

Bynum has caught 136 passes at Oregon State during his career.

### PSU wins after layoff

The Portland State Vikings played their first game in three weeks. The long layoff did the Vikes some good as the Vikings defeated Cal Lutheran 27-20 last Saturday at the Civic Stadium.

The victory over the Kingsmen improved PSU's record to 3-4, and 1-1 in the WFC play.

## NBA report

The Portland Trail Blazers improved their record to 4-1 with two easy victories over the Utah Jazz and the New York Knicks this weekend in the Memorial Coliseum.

Saturday night the Blazers embarrassed the Jazz with a win of 128-108. In that game, forward Kiki Vandewegh and guard Clyde Drexler combined for 47 points. Drexler also
