### KBOO News internship

KBOO-FM will offer a 10-week unpaid internship program in public radio news production from Jan. 29 to March 2. Five successful applicants will attend a two-hour weekly class Wednesday mornings and work an additional four to six hours each week on the KBOO News.

The purpose of the class is to train reporters and editors for the KBOO News. The classes will cover writing for radio, radio production, the law and the media, interviewing, freelancing to national news organizations and more.

Applicants must be able to type, have a broad knowledge of news, strong writing skills, a flexible schedule and be willing to work cooperatively in a hectic environment under deadline pressure. In addition, anyone accepted into the program must make a firm commitment to complete the internship and become a member of the KBOO Foundation.

The Internship Coordinator is KBOO Information Director Ross Reynolds. He has worked in public radio news for 10 years at KBOO, KMXT Kodiak, AK, Pacifica National News, WCUW-FM Worcester, MA. His work has been heard on National Public Radio, Pacifica National News, and the Alaska Public Radio Network.

To apply: Pick up an application form at KBOO and return it by Jan. 22 at 5 p.m. Applications are available at the KBOO reception desk Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. or by sending a stamped self-addressed envelope to KBOO News, 20 S.E. 8th Ave., Portland OR 97214.

KBOO has a commitment to providing access to the airwaves for disenfranchised groups. Women and minorities are encouraged to apply.


#### Latin American lecture series


