Whether you entertain a lot or a little, here are some useful tips from the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council in Oak Brook, Illinois, that can help you add a festive touch to any special

Fran Altman of the Council advises using several different kinds of sausage to make up tasty and colorful hors d'œuvres

ahead of time.

One idea: Make a "sausage cornucopia."

Roll up one half slice of salami or hard summer sausage in a funnel shape and insert a toothpick through the middle. Using a pastry tube, squeeze softened cream cheese into the center. Refrigerate until reads for use.

Or, for a variation, insert a piece of American cheese to form a bell or hide a small smoked sausage inside. Hot dogs may be sliced and warmed in a sauce of spicy salad dressing and served hot or cold on toothoicks.

For the main course, add sausage as an ingredient to pep up special dishes. Bits of Italian sausage or pork sausage will spice up bread stuffing. Thin slices of summer sausage or salami will turn an ordinary salad into an antipasto.

When your entertaining includes serving wine with sausage, here's a handy list of suggested wines that complement the different types of sausage. With smoked, country sausage serve Pinot Noir, Cabernet Sauvignon or any other dry red wine.

If Braunschweiger or liver sausage is on the menu, the wines should be either Gamay Beaujolais or Chianti. For Bratwurst, serve a very dry white

wine or Riesling.

For Kielbasa lovers, you'll want to serve one or more of the following: 1) French Colombard, 2) Grey Riesling, 3) Gamay,
