### The Resurrection of Lady Lester at IFCC


In recognition of Black History Month, and also of Oregon Artsweek during February, the Interstate Firehouse Cultural Center (IFCC) Theatre presents the West Coast premiere of The Resurrection of Lady Lester, a play about jazz musician Lester Young. Opening night is Thursday, Jan. 16, at 8 p.m., at the IFCC.


Written by Black playwright OyamO and first producted at Yale Repertory Theatre in 1981, The Resurrection of Lady Lester is subtitled "A Poetic Mood Song Based on the Legend of Lester Young." It is a provocative play, suffused with the great tenor saxophonist's special music and poetry, following the story of his life in fragmented, flashback style, always returning to his last day in a cheap New York hotel in 1959.

An onstage jazz combo accompanies the action of the play, as seven actors create a multitude of characters "summoned" from Lester's imagination and memory. Like interwoven melodies, we experience his childhood, his onenighters, his women ( including the one he nicknamed "Lady Day"), his rise to the top of his art, and his death. The New Yorker critic wrote that "it is often funny and sometimes sad, and every scene works. OyamO is a compelling dramatic writer."

The IFCC production, directed by Michael Grant, features Anthony P. Armstrong as Lester Young, Julianne R. Johnson as Lady Day, and Steve Lee, Joanna Malandruccolo, Rickie Anthony Peters, Brenda Phillips, Walter Shane, and Don Williams as various musicians, friends and oppressors. Musical direction is by Janice Scroggins, with original music from the Yale Rep production composed by Dwight Andrews. Scene design is by Jose Edwardo Gonzalez, costumes by Wanda Walden, and lighting by Colly Burgwin. The producer is Gary O'Brien and stage manager is Terry J. Nelson.

The Resurrection of Lady Lester will play Thursday, Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m., and Sunday at 2 p.m., Jan. 16 through Feb. 22. Tickets are \$8 on Thursday and Sunday, \$9 on Friday and Saturday.
