

## King Day special programs on KBOO

For the fifth year Community Radio KBOO (90.7 FM) is planning a day of special programming from 9 a.m. to 1 a.m. on Jan. 20 in commemoration of Martin Luther King Day. Highlights include:

9:00 a.m. to 11 a.m.—*Free at Last, Free at Last*—a two hour musical celebration of the life of the civil rights leader featuring music composed by Malcolm Goldstein and Archie Shepp. Works include "Been in the Storm Too Long," "Funeral" (composed by Archie Shepp as a memorial piece for Medgar Evers), and "... That Hung Like Fire on Heaven" by Malcolm Goldstein, a setting of King's "I Have a Dream" speech.

From 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. KBOO will broadcast live a special Martin Luther King ceremony from the Whitaker Middle School. Featured speakers will include Ron Herndon of the Black United Front, State Rep. Margaret Carter, and Donnie Adair, chairman of the Urban League. Among the musical groups performing will be New Beginnings, Goldie Irby, Time-sound and Tiffany Osborne.

Between 4:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Governor Vic Atiyeh will be interviewed on the significance of King Day. At 5:30 p.m. a program of gospel music will be featured.

### King School & guests honor King birthday

Portland's public school named for Martin Luther King celebrated his birthday Wednesday, Jan. 15.

Students and faculty of King Early Childhood Education Center, 4906 N.E. Sixth Ave., conducted a program honoring the late civil rights leader.

### King birthday, Black history observed at Ore. Historical Center

The January birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. and Black History Month in February will be observed at the Oregon Historical Center, Thomas Vaughan, executive director, has announced.

The Afro-American Bicentennial Commemorative Quilt, which includes portraits of the martyred civil rights leader and Nobel Laureate and other prominent Black Americans as well as scenes from history and inscriptions of special significance, has been selected from the Oregon Historical Society's collection of Black history artifacts for a special showing as part of the "Presents of the Past: Collecting Oregon's History" exhibit at the Center through Feb. 22.

Admission is free at the Oregon Historical Center, 1230 S.W. Park Ave., downtown Portland. Exhibition hours are 10 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

The Afro-American Heritage Quilt was donated to the Society as part of the U.S. Bicentennial celebration 10 years ago. It was last exhibited at the "Heritage Quilts" exhibition here in 1985.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. quilt block was made by Mrs. Perry Whitlow. The entire 30-block quilt is the work of the Afro-American Quilt Club under the leadership of Mrs. O.J. Gates, a member of the Oregon Historical Society.

The live broadcast moves to Pinocchio's Club between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. for more music and theater groups.

"The goal of the special King Day Broadcast is to bring people together to share thoughts and aspirations about 'living the dream,'" says broadcast coordinator Ken Berry.

## King Day Celebration in Portland Jan. 19
