The Oregon Department of Transportation, Highway Division, is seeking Requests for Proposal from software development and hardware consultants with demonstrated experience in real-time applications for the Woodburn Southbound Port-of-Entry Experimental Project. This project is located on I-5 southbound, milepost 274.5.

The Scope of Work is a turn-key system (consultant services, software, and hardware) to be used in the automation of Woodburn SB port-of-entry. The consultant will develop the software to interface the Supervisory System computer with the weigh-in-motion scale, the automatic vehicle identification system, and the two static electronic scales. The consultant will also recommend and procure the Supervisory System computer hardware and associated equipment based on the need to store and access the PUC vehicle data bank, the WIM/AVI data systems, and the static scale data.

**WEST VIRGINIA INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY
Montgomery, West Virginia**

The West Virginia Board of Regents invites nominations and applications for the position of President of West Virginia Institute of Technology, term of office to begin July 1, 1986.

THE COLLEGE: West Virginia Institute of Technology was established by the state legislature in 1895 as Montgomery Preparatory School, a branch of West Virginia University. The institution was reorganized several times during its early history to meet the changing educational needs of the state and region; today, it is one of 15 public institutions under the governance of the Board of Regents. West Virginia Tech is unique among the colleges of the state in that it is a multipurpose institution that offers a full array of educational degrees and programs. A fully accredited institution, West Virginia Tech offers baccalaureate degrees in engineering; the sciences; computer science; business areas, including computer management; social sciences; humanities; teacher education; and engineering technologies. Associate degrees are offered in engineering and other technologies, health, business, and general studies. In conjunction with a strong commitment to nontraditional students, the institution offers a Board of Regents degree program for older adults who gain some credits for work and life experiences. To meet the changing needs of the nontraditional student and society, West Virginia Tech maintains meaningful programs in extension and continuing education. One graduate program, a master's of engineering, is also offered. The student population of 3,000 is served by some 150 faculty and professional staff members. To fulfill its diverse educational mission, West Virginia Tech is organized into three schools: the School of Engineering and Physical Sciences, the School of Human Studies, and the Community and Technical College.

THE COMMUNITY: Montgomery, the home of West Virginia Tech, is located twenty-eight miles southeast of Charleston, the state capitol. Situated on the Kanawha River in the rugged Allegheny Mountains, Montgomery has a population of approximately 2,500. Recognizing the reciprocal benefits to be derived from mutual respect and close cooperation, the institution and the residents of Montgomery have always enjoyed amiable relations. The area is served by major transportation facilities and is characterized by a broad range of recreational opportunities.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES: The duties and responsibilities pertaining to the office of President are established by the West Virginia Board of Regents. They include, but are not specifically limited to, the following: The President of West Virginia Tech is responsible to the Board of Regents through the Chancellor. Within the framework of the policies and regulations of the Board and other governmental authorities, the President, as chief administrative officer, has general authority and responsibility for the institution. The President is expected to understand the higher education needs of the institution's service region, work cooperatively with the Board to meet those needs, and provide leadership to foster cooperation between the internal and external constituencies of the institution. In discharging the duties and responsibilities of the office, the President is expected to consult in a meaningful manner with faculty, students, classified staff, and administrators. The President is further charged with specific responsibilities for ensuring programmatic standards; supporting a quality program of student life that complements the academic program; developing a competent administrative staff and faculty; maintaining lawful, equitable, and efficient personnel policies; and providing for sound management of finances.

QUALIFICATIONS: It is recommended that a candidate for the office of President have an earned doctorate, significant academic accomplishments within the discipline of the terminal degree, and successful collegiate teaching experience and/or comparable business or industrial experience. The applicant must have had significant administrative experiences that illustrate proven leadership, including fiscal and personnel supervision, academic management, and programmatic planning. The demonstrated ability to secure external financial resources is desirable. It is essential that the applicant manifest an orientation toward public service as it relates to regional economic and cultural development; strong personal integrity; a commitment to affirmative action; and a demonstrated ability to interact sensitively and effectively with students, faculty, staff, members of the governing board, legislators, public officials, and the general public.

NOMINATIONS AND APPLICATIONS: Nominations and applications with current resumes must be postmarked no later than February 1, 1986. It is recommended that nominations be submitted two weeks prior to the application deadline. All correspondence will be kept in strictest confidence. It must be understood that the confidential nature of the application will cease when a potential candidate accepts a campus interview.
