
Cawthorne to Speak at Conference

PTA Provides Clothes to Children

At the beginning of each new school year, many stores have backto-school sales for families to clothe their children for the upcoming school year. Unfortunately, due to financial reasons, many parents aren't able to provide adequate clothing for their children. This results in some kids being absent from school

Realizing this, the Portland Council Parent Teacher Association provides adequate clothing for children in the Portland Public Schools who are in need of school clothing. Approximately 1,750 children are clothed each year.

The program works like this: The school principal or his representative, such as a community nurse or teacher, determines if there is a need for clothing. The principal at the school where the youngest child attends fills out a requisition form giving the parents' full name, the children's names and ages, the name of the school, and his signature. He must include all children in the family and also list the other schools the children attend. After Christmas, the children may make a second visit.

Girls are given 3 school outfits (dresses, skirt, or pants); 3 tops or blouses; 1 coat or jacket; and 1

Boys receive 1 pair of new and 1 pair of used jeans; 3 shirts; 1 coat or jacket; and 1 sweater. When available, underwear, socks, shoes, raincoats and boots are given.

The Clothing Center, which is located at 531 S.E. 14th Avenue, is open Monday and Thursday - September through the end of Mayfrom 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. (except when school is closed).

The Center is staffed by volunteers from local PTA units. A different school sends five workers each day the Center is open. They work under a committee of twelve appointed by the Portland Council

School Buses Ready For 13,000 Portland Students

Portland schools provide transportation for primary and middle school students living more than one mile from school, in situations where unsafe walking routes exist, and for special education students.

"Motorists are reminded to watch for young children on Portland's streets after Labor Day," said Ed Green, director of Portland's student transportation system.

Green said commuters relax during the summer months when young children and school buses aren't sharing the streets during rush hours. He said school bus drivers write down license plate numbers of motorists violating school bus warning lights.
