

Shutting down Trojan would increase Oregonians electric bills because elec-tricity from Trojan is far less expensive (2.6¢ per kilowatt hour) than electricity (2.5e per knownt nour) than electricity that would have to be used (which costs up to 7e per kilowatt hour) to replace Trojan's electricity. There is no surplus of reliable electricity at Trojan's predictable

cheapest sources of electricits. It is estimated that the cost of replacing Trojan's power would be over a billion dollars. We re the one's who will pavevery month in our utility bills. Higher utility rates caused by shutting down Trojan will hurt everyone, including those living on fixed incomes. Before you yote, please think about the price tag for all Oregonians, especially those least able to pay \$\frac{1}{2}\$.
