

James DePreist to Speak at First Annual Sacred Arts Awards Benefit

James DePreist, music director of the Oregon Symphony Orchestra and internationally recognized conductor, will speak at the First Annual Sacred Art Awards Benefit, May 8, 7:30, in the Mago Hunt Center at the University of Portland. The first-of-its-kind art event will be Chaired by Rodney Page. executive director of Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon and Bishop Waldschmidt of the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon.

This unique arts event will showcase the cultural achievements of the Church community in the greater Portland area. The evening's activities will include: an exhibition of contemporary visual sacred art; the presentation of awards to artist and patrons. There will also be a presentation of the award-winning local Christian performing artists in the fields of dance. music, and drama. OABA Reveals **Black Concerns to** Goldschmidt

Last month members of the Oregon Assembldy for Black Affairs (OABA) met with Gov. Neil Goldschmidt in Salem to discuss issues concerning Black Oregonians.

Calvin O.L. Henry, president of OABA, said he along with OABA vicepresident Robert Phillips; Willie Richardson, Treasurer; Shirley Minor, Chair, Employment Committee; Dr. Wilbert Gamble, Chair, Education Committee; and Michael Clark discussed a wide range of issues that are important to Blacks and other minorities during the meeting with Gold-

The issues discussed with the Governor were part of the OABA resolutions agreed upon during its 1987 Call-to-Action Leadership Conference and the 1986 Oregon Black Political Convention. The concerns include lack of business and economic development in Black communities, adult and youth joblessness, education, health services, energy and transportation,

Henry praised Goldschmidt for inviting OABA to meet with him and discuss his administration's objectives and the concerns of Blacks in the state. Henry said the OABA wishes the Goldschmidt administration success, and that his organization is ready to assist the Governor in the "Oregon Come-

Henry said although the meeting with Goldschmidt was a positive one. OABA voiced its concerns to the Governor about the Affirmative Action Advisory Committee he established. The Advisory Committee will evaluate the Governor's Affirmative Action office and develop specific recommendations for expanding and improving the state's program.

Henry said, "The time lines for this raises questions about Goldschmidt's seriousness concerning Affirmative Action and involving Blacks and others in his administration." Henry feels such a committee should have been

Beside the issue of Affirmative Action, OABA members listed four other

established during the transition. the Governor. OABA feels that the Governor should appoint his Director of Affirmative Action immediately," Henry said. He said the position can not be moved to the Executive Department without Legislative action, and that the Director of Affirmative Action should have the powers of the Governor behind him or her for the Affirmative Action program to be sucareas of concern to Goldschmidt that they hope to resolve.
