Blood Drive to be Held At PCC Cascade

Portland Community College Cascade Campus will host a blood drive on Thursday, May 7 from 9:30 AM to 2:30 PM, sponsored by The Associated Students of PCC Cascade. The bloodmobile will be in the school gym, 705 N. Killingsworth.

This upcoming blood drive has a goal of 50 units, 15 units more than the last two drives held at PCC Cascade. All people in the community who are eligible to donate blood are strongly encouraged to participate.

Type O blood is needed! Fifty percent of the population has type O blood and the number of people who can receive type O is much larger. There is a great demand for this blood type, however only five percent of the population provides all of the blood donated. This fact stresses the importance of first time donors.

Donating blood is safe, easy, almost painless, and the whole procedure takes less than an hour. Ask any one of the 16,000 first timers who donated last year. To be eligible to donate a person must weight at least 110 pounds, be between the ages of 17 and 65, and be in good health.

It is just as important for all our regulars to continue to donate. Remember, you can donate every 56 days!
