PCC Appoints Director of Research

Susan K. Bach, a 15-year employee of Portland Community College, has been appointed Director of Institutional Research for the college.

Bach has been acting director since the April 30 retirement of M. Mill-cent Williamson. Bach began her PCC career as the organizer of a peer tutoring system at the Sylvania Campus Drop-in Center, eventually supervised drop-in centers on three campuses and later worked as coordinator of a project for vocationally disadvantaged persons at two campuses.

Bach also served in staff support roles for developmental education, student support and educational support services. She was contract administrator for the Portland Area Refugee Services Consortium from 1981-85, and coordinated PCC's Refugee English as a Second Language project from 1983 to 1985.

Bach joined PCC's Research and Planning Department in August, 1986, with primary responsibility for the development of a program assessment model. She also monitored and reported on vocational grants and surveyed the need for a continuing education program for health care professionals.

In 1985, Bach was on the executive committee of an accreditation self-study for PCC's institutional re-accreditation. She has served on numerous other administrative committees at the college and is a member of both the Association of Institutional Research and Pacific Northwest Association for Institutional Research and Planning.

Bach has a 1964 bachelor's degree in English from Willamette University and earned a master's degree in public administration from Lewis and Clark College last year. She also has completed graduate level courses in business administration, English and secondary education. She taught English for two years at South Salem High School before joining the PCC staff.

Bach's husband, Rodney C. Bach, is an instructor in PCC's Educational Paraprofessional programs.
