Teen Abuse Discussed at Training

The problems of adolescent chemical abuse, including identification and treatment, will be examined at a series of training programs offered by Kaiser Permanente's Adolescent Chemical Health Program. The training programs are specifically designed for school personnel, teachers, school administrators, counselors, and other youth service personnel in the community. Each course will be held on three consecutive days from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at Kaiser Permanente's residential treatment center, 2330 N.E. Siskiyou, Portland. All courses will be offered twice throughout the spring and summer, with the exception of the support group training which will be offered four times. For more information or to register, call the Adolescent Chemical Health Program at (503) 249-1477.

An Introduction to Adolescent **Chemical Abuse** and Its Problems

will be offered February 9, 11-12 and again April 27-29. The course will explore the effects of chemical use, abuse, and dependency on adolescents and their families. Drug classification, the differences between adult and adolescent dependency, enabling, denial and the recovery process will be discussed.

Adolescent Chemical Use

will be offered February 23-24 and May 2-4. Some of the topics to be covered include effective assessment interviews, involvement of family members in the assessment process, and the characteristics of high-risk adolenscents.

Support Groups in Schools

offered March 7-11, May 16-20, June 20-24, and August 22-26, develops group learning skills so participants can create or strengthen existing support groups for recoving adolescents. Establishing goals and ground rules, encouraging cooperative effort, work with a cofacilitator, and effective leadership styles will be taught through actual group ex-

perience. **CORE Team Training Program**

will be offered January 11-15 and April 18-22. CORE teams are groups of faculty, counselors, and administrators who provide student assistance programs. The course will focus on team building skills, roles and responsibilities, and action plans to develop CORE teams.

Kaiser Permanente's Adolescent Chemical Health Program serves all families in the metropolitan area. It offers outpatient and residential care to anyone between the ages of 12 and 18 with a drug or alcohol problem.

PNB Temporarily Waives 976 Charges

The 976 services have been controversial in Oregon and in other states. They were first allowed in Oregon in early 1985.
