James Wilson Retires

When James Wilson recently retired, nearly 300 coworkers and friends from around the nation came to his new home in West Linn to celebrate with him and to wish him good luck in any endeavor he might undertake in the future. Wilson on July 1, ended a 25-year career with the United Parcel Service, a career he began in Washington, D.C. when he applied for work as a U.P.S. truck driver, and ended with 10 years of service as a district manager for the company.

Wilson was the recipient of many cards and light hearted gifts, accompanied with reminiscences punctuated with laughter from "buddies" he had made as he progressed from truck driver to mechanic and on to the U.P.S. management program, all in the first year. His first assignment in the Automotive Management Department was to oversee the Washington fleet of 250 vehicles. The next year he was in Richmond, Virginia to look after 350 vehicles. In 1970, there were 1,400 vehicles to look after in New Jersey. Then in 1974 Wilson became a regional automotive manager to be responsible for 4,000 U.P.S. vehicles for Kentucky, Ohio and Michigan. Two years later he had the same title in upstate New York and New Jersey, and had responsibility for 6,000 U.P.S. vehicles.

During 1977, Wilson was promoted to be the District Manager in the Operations Department.

By 1978-1980, Wilson was sent to Oregon as a district manager responsible for the U.P.S. opera-

tions, delivery, customer service, information and automotive of the fleet and the supervision of the 1,500 employees of the U.P.S. in Oregon.

In 1981, James Wilson, and his wife Edith, were married and he, as district manager, was transferred to Buffalo, New York. Within four years, by March of 1985, the U.P.S. region of Southern California, with its 3,500 employees, became Wilson's territory.

The period from October 1987 to Wilson's July 1988 retirement was spent in the U.P.S. office of Strategic Planning where discussions and explorations are underway in U.P.S. considerations of the latest technological advances for delivery and accounting for U.P.S. operations.

Wilson gives the U.P.S. Company, founded in Seattle in 1907, high credit for being a forth right equal opportunity employer. He notes his own successful experience and that of Calvin Tyler, the first Black to become a U.P.S. District Manager (Tyler within this month of July has become the national personnel manager for U.P.S.).

"U.P.S. definitely has a wonderful set of employees and it is a wonderful company to work for," Wilson said as he greeted more guests to his party.

Late in the evening, as friends began to depart, Jim Wilson was handed a final gift, presented by seven U.P.S. regional managers. The gift was a plaque, polished and shining, featuring a copy of his long ago application to be a truck driver for U.P.S.

Starting A New Career

Baseball great Henry Aaron, who began and ended his legendary career in Wisconsin, has signed an agreement with Arby's Inc. to develop and operate as many as 15 roast beef sandwich restaurants in that state over the next several years.

Aaron is scheduled to open his first Arby's early this summer. Construction began in late April on the 2,400-square-foot Series 2000 unit, Arby's newest model. It will be located on Wisconsin Avenue in Port Washington. Once in operation, the restaurant will

employ 35 to 50 people. Aaron's 14 other Arby's restaurants also will be located in the greater Milwaukee area. His franchise operation is called Hank Aaron Enterprises, Inc.

Aaron has been associated with Atlanta-based Arby's for the past three years as a company spokesman for Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America (BB/BSA), an organization that matches children from single-parent homes with adult companions. Together, Aaron and Arby's have raised more than \$1.5 million for BB/BSA.

In addition, Arby's has established the Hank Aaron/Big Brothers/Big Sisters Scholarship Fund. Through this program, the fast-food chain awards \$5,000 college scholarships to boys and girls who have been affiliated with Big Brothers/Big Sisters. Each scholarship is renewable annually for four years, giving it a total value of \$20,000.

"Having been closely associated with Arby's through the Big Brothers/Big Sisters program and seeing the tremendous contributions this organization has made to many of our country's

young people, I knew Arby's was a company in which I wanted to invest more than my time," said Aaron.

"Wisconsin is like a second home to me. I am delighted to be returning to begin my Arby's venture with Hank Aaron Enterprises."

Hank Aaron began his baseball career in 1954 with the Milwaukee Braves. In 1966, he traveled with the Braves to a new home, Atlanta, where he hit his famous 715th home run, breaking the long-standing record held by Babe Ruth. Aaron was traded to Milwaukee after the 1974 season and finished his career with the Brewers.

In 23 years of playing, Aaron rewrote baseball's record books: He holds the record for most home runs (755), most runs batted in (2,297), most games (3,298), most plate appearances (13,940) and most times at bat (12,364). A resident of Atlanta, Aaron is now vice president in charge of player development for the Atlanta Braves.

Arby's President and Chief Executive Officer Leonard Roberts said he is pleased to have Aaron join the company in its rapid expansion efforts.

"Hank Aaron is a fine person and legendary sports figure whose name is synonymous with excellence. He will be a credit to the Arby's organization," said Roberts.

Seminar on Alcoholism in the Black Community

On October 14-16, 1988 the 8th Annual Seminar on Alcoholism in the Black Community (ABC) is being offered in Newark, N.J. For information contact: Alcoholism in the Black Community (ABC), c/o East Orange General Hospital, 300 Central Ave., E. Orange, NJ 07018.

Some facts:
1) Black women represent the highest proportion of abstainers from alcohol compared to whites. Data indicates that 61% of white women are drinkers compared to 49% for black women.

2) Black women who do drink are more likely than white women to engage in heavy drinking —
3) 63% of the victims of black homicides were under the influence of alcohol in Atlanta, 55% in Cleveland, 56% in Miami, and 49% in Washington, D.C.

4) An interview of convicted black felons indicated about

50% were alcoholic or problem drinkers. A study in Florida shows 1/3 of the black inmates were under the influence of alcohol at the time they committed their crimes.

5) Research has shown that black youth are more likely to receive their first drink from parents while white youths were more likely to receive their first drink from friends.

This year, ABC will include workshops on Alcoholism and the Black Woman, Alcoholism and Black Youth, Alcoholism and the Black Church, Counseling Blacks on the Job, Alcoholism and the Black Family, Alcoholism

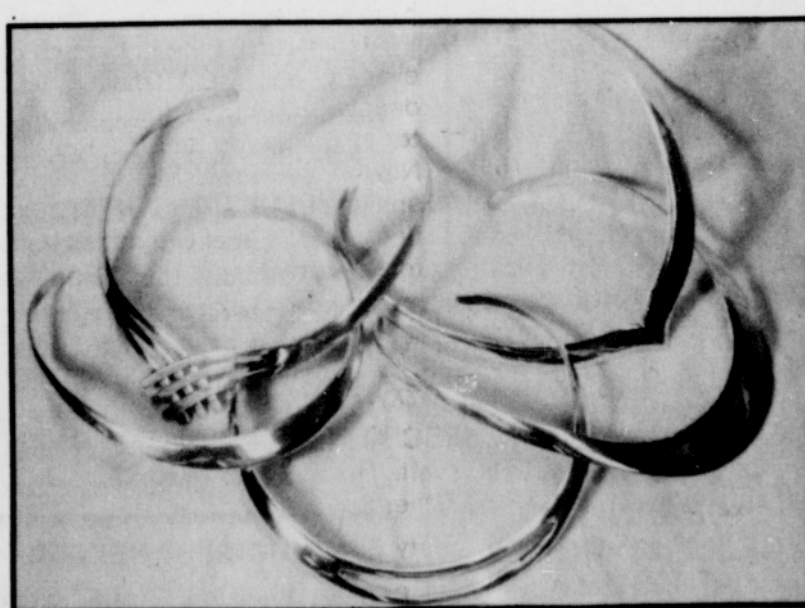

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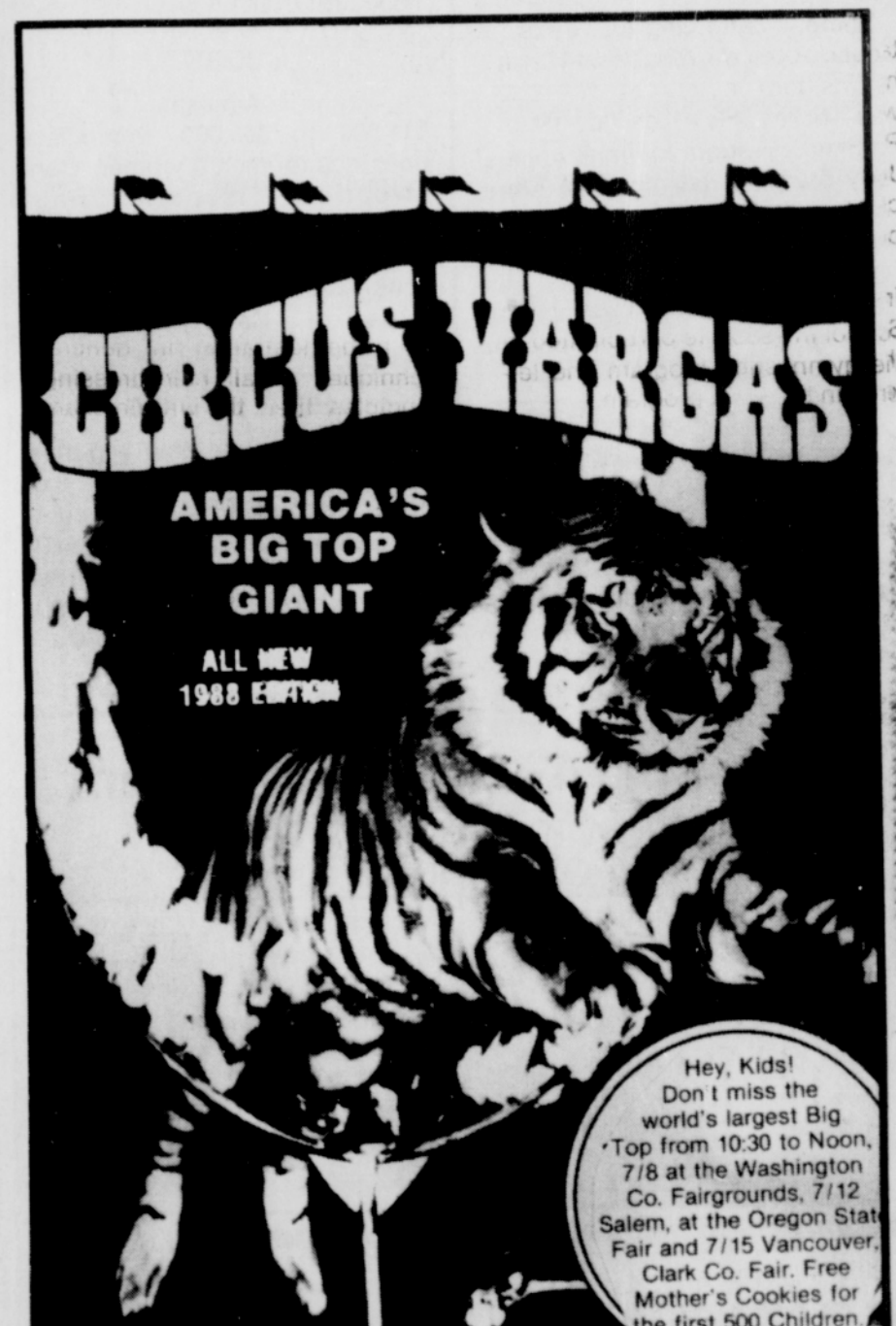
